Copco Revenues Top \$10 Million First Time

The California Oregon Power company this week reported gross operating revenues for the 12 months ending March 31, of \$10,120,000, compared with \$9,306,944 for the same period, a year ago. This is the first time that gross operating revenues have exceeded \$10 million.

Sales of electricity to residential customers during this 12-month period increased 16.3 per cent over those of the previous year and averaged 4,773.25 kilowatt-hours per customer, at an average cost of 1.588 cents per kilowatt-hour.

Gross operating revenues for March, 1950, were \$912,291, up 15.3 per cent over March, 1949.
