Chinese Reds Plan Assault on Hainan
Hong Kong, Apr. 12—(U.P.)—The Chinese communists are saving their air force for the expected spring and summer assault on Hainan and Formosa islands, reports from Communist China said today.

These reports said the communists now have about 300 planes. About 200 are Russian types and the remainder are Japanese types and American planes received under license.

Recent nationalist reports said communist fighter planes encountered over Shanghai refused combat to nationalist bombers.

Other reports said the communists have massed 100,000 troops south of Hanchow bay on the mainland for an expected assault on the Chusan islands, nationalist naval base near the mouth of the Yangtze.

Port of Portland Cargo Tonnage Up
Portland, Ore., Apr. 12—Cargo tonnage moved at the port of Portland last month was 153,000 short tons, more than in February, the Merchants Exchange said here today.

The exchange said more than 690,000 short tons moved across Portland docks in March compared with 537,000 in February.

Foreign ships docking here last month included visitors from Great Britain, Canada, Denmark, Holland, France, Honduras and Sweden.

Log Scaling Bureau Files Incorporation
Salem, Ore., Apr. 12—(U.P.)—The Southern Oregon Log Scaling and Grading bureau, with headquarters at Roseburg, filed articles of incorporation here today.

Among its objectives the bureau listed one "to foster the business of scaling and grading of logs and other timber products, to reform abuses therein and to produce uniformity and certainty in the practice, custom and usage of the business of scaling and grading of logs and timber products."

SHAKING PALSY—PARALYSIS AGITANS

Judging by the number of letters I receive requesting information on shaking palsy, it is evident that the treatment of this condition has been largely ineffective up to this time.

Shaking palsy—Paralysis Agitans and Parkinson's disease—are all names for the same disease. It is a disease of later life, appearing usually in the sixties, and nothing is known as to the actual cause.

It commences insidiously. Usually, the victim's attention is first directed to his condition by some one else. Trembling, twitching and tremor (trembling, twitching) are the outstanding symptoms of the disease.

The tremor is most noticeable in the hands and fingers where a "pill-rolling" movement becomes more or less constant. The muscular rigidity limits the ease of the victim's movements which become slow and deliberate. In walking the victim leans forward to get started and then takes short running steps to maintain his balance.

Late in the disease some impediment of speech occurs. The intellect remains intact and attention is not disturbed. Victims of the disease who are engaged in mental pursuits may continue to work indefinitely, but ultimately become highly restricted in their physical activities.

Medical treatment relieves the rigidity to some extent but has little effect upon the tremor. Strong muscular effort will stop the tremor for a few minutes. The tremor affects the handwriting which exhibits a typical shakiness.

Much interest has centered upon certain drugs which have been used in this affliction. These drugs, while appreciably effective, often produce undesirable side-effects such as annoying dryness of the mouth, nose and throat. Frequent muscular manipulation and massage are of some value but other forms of physical medicine have not added much to the scope of remedies.

At times the tremor may become very coarse and involve a large part of the body. Such cases are relieved by a surgical operation which is performed upon the spinal cord in the neck. The incision is made in the back of the neck overlying the spine.

Following the operation, paralysis of one side of the body results for a short time, but control returns along with disappearance of or great improvement in the tremor.

An operation upon the brain has also resulted in improvement in many cases. The indications for surgical interference must be determined by the physician in charge of the individual cases as no hard and fast rule can be applied. Surgery is reserved for those cases which have resisted all medical treatment.

Not only do we know little or nothing about the cause of this disease—we know nothing about how to prevent it. However, some cases appear to be due to arteriosclerosis—at any rate they accompany it—and measures against this development seem worth while. Again, even these "measures" are indefinite and relate to the maintenance of general health. Here is another disease.

Bandits Take \$11,000 From Montana Bank
Valley, Mont., Apr. 12—(U.P.)—Two armed men held up the Farmers' and Stockmen's state bank here today and escaped with approximately \$11,000, the sheriff's office reported.

The robbery occurred about 8:15 a.m., when Cashier N. S. Swanson, opened the bank, officers said.

Swanson said the bandits, masked and each with two guns, were waiting for him in a car outside the bank when he arrived to open the doors.

They pushed him into the building and forced him to open the bank vault, he said, then bound and gagged him.
