

Deschutes Water Flowing in Canals

Bend, Ore., Apr. 13.—(U.P.)—Deschutes river water was flowing through canals in Crook, Jefferson and Deschutes counties of central Oregon today as the 1950 irrigation system got underway with water supply forecasts labeled as good to excellent.

For the time being, only the direct flow of the Deschutes river will be diverted into the canals from the Bend area. Observers noted that the river flow is so heavy that water was racing through Bend at the rate of 1100 second feet.

Reservoirs of the upper Deschutes basin are filled to capacity and some were overflowing. Water content in snow still in the mountains has been analyzed as being very high.

Russia Resumes Shipping of Vital Ore to America

Washington, Apr. 13.—(U.P.)—Russia resumed shipping vital chrome and manganese ore to the United States in February after a one-month lapse, the commerce department said today.

February shipments of the strategic ores were valued at \$200,000. Total imports from Russia, consisting largely of furs, and manufactured items, were valued at \$4,600,000 in February, compared with \$2,400,000 in January.

The department said that imports from 12 countries behind the iron curtain dropped from \$12,200,000 in January to \$11,500,000 in February. Sharp drops were recorded in shipments from Czechoslovakia and Finland.

On the export side, however, shipments to the 12 countries rose from \$7,300,000 in January to \$8,500,000 in February. A comparatively large increase was reported in shipments to Yugoslavia, which rose from \$1,100,000 in January to \$2,900,000 in February.

Exports to Marshall plan nations rose from January's level of \$238,000,000 to \$265,700,000 in February. Imports from Marshall plan nations dropped to \$70,800,000 in February from January's figure of \$80,400,000.

Portland, Ore., Apr. 13.—(U.P.)—Portland's city council Wednesday gave final approval for the sale of a four-acre tract of land to Multnomah college for \$36,000. The tract is at S.W. 18th and Jefferson.

Army Lifts Some Secrets Of Rocket Motor Research At New York Test Station

Malta, N. Y., Apr. 13.—(U.P.)—The army lifted some of the secrecy from its rocket motor research program today after throwing open the gates of its Malta test station to a score of newsmen.

The station, operated by the General Electric company, is located on an isolated 3,000-acre tract several miles south of Saratoga race track. Experiments on rocket motors and fuels have been going on at the station since 1945.

Tests Large Motors
The station has firing pits capable of testing the largest rocket motor ever built. The tests are designed to reduce the overall weight of motors and cut down fuel consumption while maintaining the maximum amount of thrust.

The newsmen yesterday witnessed the firing of two rocket motors from stationary stands. One, approximately 12 inches in diameter and three feet long, produced 16,000 pounds of thrust, twice the driving power exerted by the largest jet engine.

No rockets are launched at the Malta station. After tests, the motors are shipped to White Sands, N. M., for actual flight tests.

Several Fuels
Fuels being tested include hydrazine, hydrogen peroxide, boron hydrides, gasoline and liquid oxygen and alcohol.

Dr. Richard W. Porter, in charge of the station, said American engineers have greatly increased the efficiency of rocket motors since the German V-2 was captured.

Army spokesmen said GE's research program has reached a point where large-scale power plants of higher efficiency, less weight and greater reliability than World War II motors can be built. Beyond that, they said, no announcement can be made because of security reasons.

May Escape Earth
Porter, one of the country's outstanding rocket motor engineers, said "it is technically feasible to escape the earth" in a rocket. He added, however, that

Grade School Students To Plant Forest Trees

Forest Grove, Ore., Apr. 13.—(U.P.)—One hundred seventh graders from James John elementary school in Portland were to put in a full day's work on the reforestation project in the Tillamook burn today.

The boys and girls are members of three science classes, and they will spend the day planting fir seedlings in the burn. The seedlings were furnished by the state forestry department, and members of the northwest district reforestation staff directed the planting.

A six-acre tract was set aside for the school project, said District Warden Edward Schroeder. On the basis of past experience, pupils should be able to plant from 50 to 75 trees each during the day. If they are fast workers, they can plant as many as 100 seedlings, he said.

This was the first time a public school group participated in the reforestation program, although church and Boy scout

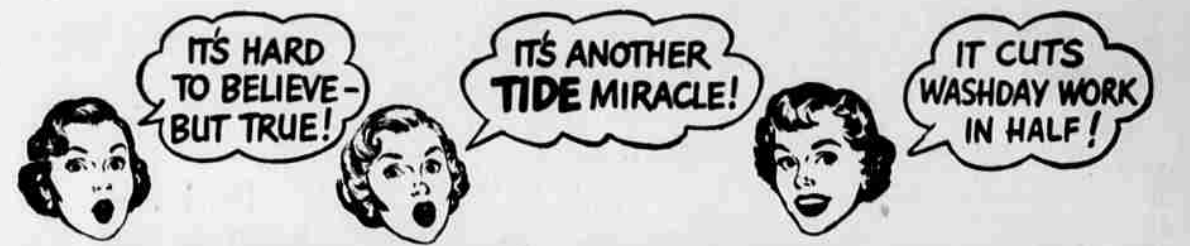
