Your Health and Its Care

PEOPLE ARE CHILDISH ABOUT THE C-R-I

C-R-I is not another word for "cold." It is a coined word, an abbreviation for the cumbersome phrase Common Respiratory Infection. Saves time to say C-R-I (pronounced kree) instead of iterating those three words. Neither you nor your doctor knows or can tell at the onset what the C-R-I, which you hope is just a slight

distemper, indisposition or, if you are very ignorant indeed or very vicious, a slight "cold," will turn out to be — meningitis, measles, flu, infantile paralysis, virus pneumonia, scarlet fever, septic (streptococci) sore throat, acute rhinitis, whooping cough or whatnot. Therefore if you are a decent citizen you call it C-R-I until the nature of the trouble becomes manifest. If you are a stinker you insist it is "just a cold" until you have spread whatever you have among the persons who are unfortunate enough to come within your spray range. That's what C-R-I means.

In any school that is reasonably safe for children to attend a child who shows signs or symptoms of the C-R-I is automatically excluded or excused from attendance until the indisposition or illness is over. In some schools, however, the health of the pupils is not so protected. On the contrary teacher or principal encourages pupils to come to school as long as they are able, regardless of "simple colds." The attendance record must be kept high at whatever cost to life and health.

On radio programs, television and public forum presentations, participants are sometimes praised for appearing in spite of "severe cold" or perhaps for "getting out of sick bed" to attend the performance.

One of the members of a football team that had a fair chance to play the Rose Bowl game came down with the C-R-I the day before the final and critical game of the season. But his friends, his family, his team mates and everyone, it seemed, concerned, encouraged him to subordinate all precautions for his own welfare and the safety

of those within his spray range and be the hero for old Siwash the doctor gave him 100,000 units of penicillin and maybe a shot of dope besides, and the young man thrilled the conventional roaring crowd by coming out to play the game.

Instead of admiring and praising individuals who commit this crime against public health as the ignorant and irresponsible ones among us do, we should call a cop, a sanitary or health officer or policeman, that is, and have the offenders pinched and properly isolated until the C-R-I is over.

In the case of a child going to school with the C-R-I, the parent, guardian, teacher, nurse or school physician responsible for the breach of hygiene should be arrested and punished. The Common Respiratory Infections cause most of the illness attended by physicians. They are responsible for a great deal of surgery. They figure prominently in the mortality statistics. They are spread almost exclusively via a direct cough, sneeze or conversational spray or droplet infection. They are almost entirely preventable by reasonable isolation, that is, keeping beyond the spray range of the individual who has the disease.

In view of these facts isn't it about time to discard those outmoded notions of cold, dampness, drafts, wet feet, sudden changes, insufficient clothing, night air and chilling and apply a little common sense to the prevention of the respiratory infections?

QUESTIONS & ANSWERS
Electro-coagulation at Tonsils

Answer—No. On the contrary, moderate use of coffee is beneficial in many cases of coronary disease. The caffeine (active principle or alkaloid of coffee) tends to dilate the coronary arteries, and the blood delivers more oxygen to the heart muscle.

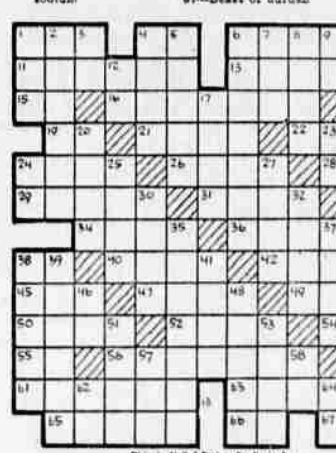
