The Pete Belcastro-Arne Skaal and combination won the tag team wrestling match over Rod Fenton and the Great Atlas at the armory last night, but it took favors by the Atlas and Referee Earl Yoakley to get it.

More time was spent with all four principals in the ring engaging in wild brawls than in straight tag team wrestling but the fans lapped it up and constantly screamed for more.

The first fall was won by the Atlas with a painful full nelson on Skaal. The hold disabled the likeable Norwegian for further combat during the evening and Belcastro more than carried the load alone. He resorted to his famed uppercut and smashed Fenton and the Atlas all over the joint before pinning Fenton with a surfboard.

Full Nelson Used
When Belcastro applied the full-winning hold, the Atlas jumped into the ring and waded until Yoakley gave the fall to Belcastro, then he caught the Weed Italian in a full nelson and held him in it for a minute and 45 seconds before Yoakley could break it up. The arbiter ruled that the Peacock of the Ring had no business in the ring at that time and gave the deciding fall to Belcastro.

Ted Bell gave Leo Wallick a busy time for 43 minutes before being knocked out by Wallick's pile driver. It required Dr. W. G. Bishop's smelling salts to revive Bell but he came around too late for Bell to come back for further hostilities.

Nevada Coach Raps Finding

Reno, Nev., Apr. 14 (U.P.)—Head Football Coach Joe Sheeketski of the University of Nevada warned today that if recommendations by a scholastic-minded faculty are adopted the entire athletic setup at Nevada sooner or later will be destroyed.

The faculty fact-finding committee's report, calling for a complete overhaul of the athletic program, will be presented to the school's board of regents Saturday for a decision.

With open frankness, Sheeketski declared he is alarmed over the future prospect for Nevada football teams if the faculty action, which he said was "railroaded through and rubber-stamped," is upheld by the regents.

Sheeketski, a former Notre Dame backfield star, has four years to run on a contract which pays him \$12,000 a year with an increase due next year.

San Francisco, Apr. 14 (U.P.)—Portland's cold, wet weather apparently doesn't agree with the Hollywood Stars. The Twinks outlived the Beavers 4 to 3 last night in a Pacific Coast Football league game, but the score was in the other direction—Portland winning 3 to 1.

The Twinks' loss and San Diego's blistering 8 to 1 defeat of San Francisco, left only eight percentage points between the Padres and the Stars at the top of the league standings.

Hollywood's games-won percentage is .714 with 10 wins and four losses while San Diego stands at .706 with 12 victories and five defeats.

Portland used Pitcher Lyman Line to upset the Stars and retain third place on the ladder. Lynn allowed Hollywood one run in the fourth inning, when Eddie Sauer smacked a double and then came home on a single.

The Beavers got their three runs in the same inning as Hubie Yankee walked, Luis Marquez and Johnny Rucker, then tossed Steve Mesner's bunt too late to third. That filled the sacks for Right Fielder Bob Cherry. He doubled to score Marquez and Rucker and came home himself on Joe Polick's single.

Harry Cassill, director of athletics, said the popular Husky coach was sick most of the past basketball season and his physician had advised complete separation from current coaching duties in order to regain his health.

McLarney came to Washington in the spring of 1947 from Seattle's Roosevelt high school. In his first season as basketball coach, his team won the Pacific Coast conference title and finished third in the western regional playoffs at Kansas City.
