Refreshments were served, with Roberta Wolfe, Jean McGuire and Lora Mae Letter assisting the hostess.

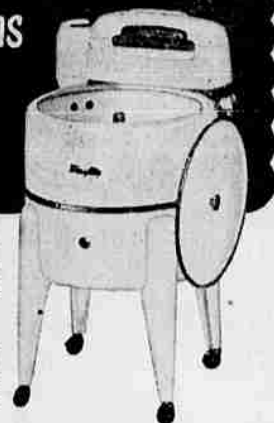

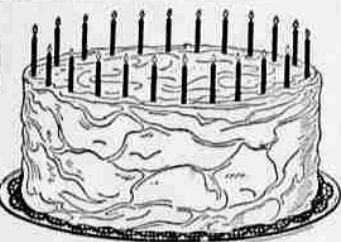

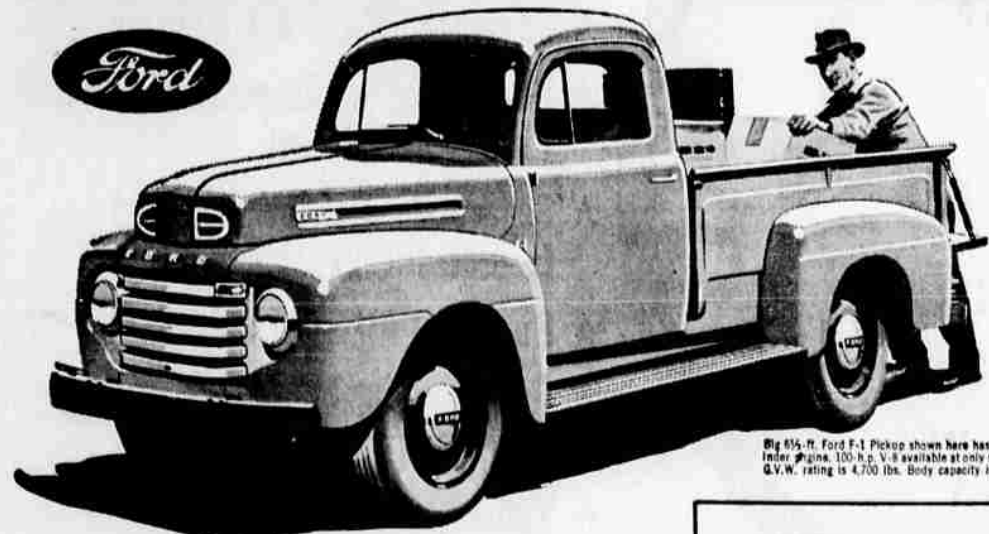
