Medford Teacher Named Zonta Woman of the Year

Mrs. Justin Smith has been named "Woman of the Year" by Medford Zonta club in recognition for her endeavor in the field of international relations study. Mrs. Smith's selection was announced at the club's annual formal banquet Thursday in the Jackson hotel, and she was presented an award scroll and flowers.

The award winner is secretly selected by a Zonta committee and Zonta club members are not eligible.

The announcement and presentation was made by Miss Josephine Kirtley, past president of the club and co-worker with Mrs. Smith at Medford senior high school where Mrs. Smith is instructor of civics and international relations.

In making the announcement, Miss Kirtley told Mrs. Smith's activities with the Medford branch of American Association of University Women, Medford League of Women Voters and other groups. The award winner helped to found the local units of both these organizations and is a past president of each.

In addition she has led international relations study groups for both for several years, and has helped to train leaders for other groups.

Mrs. Smith is a member of the Oregon committee for UNESCO and two years ago attended the convention of UNESCO held in San Francisco. As chairman of the international relations committee of Oregon Education association she was largely responsible for founding the Oregon International Relations league for senior high school students a few years ago and has been advisor of the Medford high school league.

Along other lines, Mrs. Smith has been a member of the board of Jackson County Red Cross chapter for several years and gives indoctrination courses for the chapter from time to time.

Speaker for the award dinner was Donald McDougall, professor of history at Southern Oregon college. He appropriately spoke on foreign policy, saying that he believed this country's policy of "containment" was insufficient and too negative in character. He reviewed the period of founding of the world bank and establishment of the Marshall plan, pointing out that this had been quite successful in "containing" Russia as far as Europe is concerned, but that China had been lost to Russian communists.

Dr. McDougall said he believed this negative "hold the line" policy will prove insufficient and that this country must promote an aggressive policy of aiding countries which may wish to become democratic. "Europeans should be forced to relinquish their grip on colonies and we should aid those countries to become democratic, if they desire," he stated.

The speaker said that if the colonial nations could be aided in their transition from merely raw material "farms" for industrial nations to some degree of industrialization of their own, it would enable them to raise their standard of living and promote friendlier relations with this country.

"If we don't help them, the Russians will," he said, and reminded his listeners of a popular saying in the so-called "backward" countries to the effect that "we are supposed to fight for democracy but not to have it ourselves."

He urged that this country sell its food surpluses to other countries, pointing out the undesirable effect this nation's food surpluses create in the minds of the rest of the world, when two-thirds of the world is hungry.

Also on the program was Larry Brunette, who sang a group of solos accompanied by Ray Lewis. Mrs. Goldie Hauer, president, welcomed the guests and Mrs. Florene Bolton was toastmistress.

Other guests introduced were Mrs. Joe Beach of district four, Oregon State Nurses' association; Mrs. Bren H. Starcher, Mail Tribune; Mrs. George Maddox, president of Women of Rotary; Mrs. Bertha Haskins, president of Medford Business and Professional Woman's club; Miss Louise Drew, Rotana club officer; Mrs. John Carter, president of the Medford Council of Parents and Teachers; Mrs. E. W. Thomas, officer of Kiwanian Dames; Mrs. C. D. Winston, registrar of Southern Oregon college, and Mrs. A. Orin Schenck, Miss Vera Humphrey and Mrs. George B. Canode, the last three being winners of the Women of the Year award in past years.
