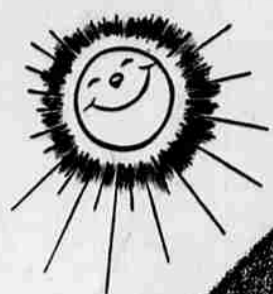
Clyde Walker who underwent surgery at a Medford hospital April 13 is reported to be gaining satisfactorily and will return home early this week.
