Multnomah Sheriffs Receive Suspensions

Portland, Ore., Apr. 22—(U.P.) Sheriff Terry D. Schunk said today he has suspended two Multnomah county deputy sheriffs on a general charge of conduct unbecoming an officer.

The suspended officers were Joseph Muzyn and Edward J. Grohs. Schunk said the suspensions were an outgrowth of a housewarming last Tuesday night at the home of Rex Lowry, another deputy sheriff. Schunk said Muzyn and Grohs were reported to have left their district while on duty and to have driven to Lowry's home more than a mile away.

While they were there, three or four shots were fired and a small amount of damage caused in the residence, Schunk said. The suspensions were made indefinitely until the disciplinary committee composed of captains in the uniform division. Two other deputies who left their district for a few minutes to deliver a present to the Lowrys were reprimanded by the sheriff.

Killer of Son Step Nearer to Recovery

Klamath Falls, Ore., Apr. 22—(U.P.)—Mrs. Lola Patrick, 26-year-old Jefferson, Ore., resident who "didn't want to live" after she killed her six-year-old son, was a step nearer recovery from a self-inflicted bullet wound today. Mrs. Patrick was moved from the Klamath Valley hospital to the infirmary Friday, Sheriff Jack Franey reported. She was critically wounded March 31 after she shot and killed her son, Lyndell, because she "couldn't stand to see him live in poverty."

She is charged with first degree murder, Franey said, and will be prosecuted as soon as she recovers. Since her arrest her hospital room has been under constant "suicide watch." She underwent surgery which was credited with saving her life.

Red Cross To Aid Astoria Home Owners

San Francisco, Apr. 22—(U.P.)—Red Cross disaster funds totaling \$88,000 have been allocated to help finance the wholesale movement of 17 homes threatened by a creeping landslide in Astoria, Ore., the agency said today.

Deputy Manager Robert F. Shea of the Pacific area said preparations were "virtually complete" to begin moving the homes. They will be taken to new lots provided by the city about two miles from the moving hillside.

Movement will begin today, Shea said. Shea added that the allocation was "somewhat unique" in the annals of Red Cross disaster operations because funds will be used before the actual damage occurs.

Zoo Attendants Hunt For Missing Mouflon

Portland, Ore., Apr. 22—(U.P.)—Attendants from the Portland zoo today continued their search for their missing mouflon. The mouflon, or mountain sheep, can run, jump and climb. Attendants said the animal hurdled the six-foot zoo fence in search for greener pastures.

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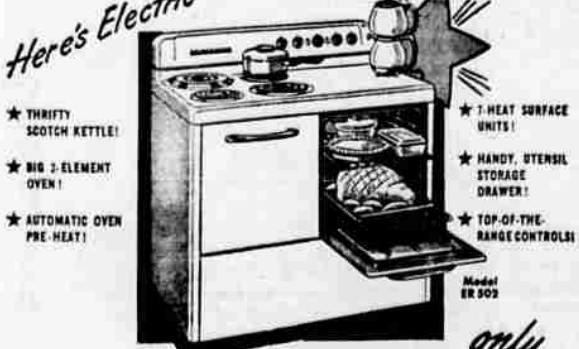
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
