

Senior High Jayvee Trackmen Stop Ashland Junior Varsity

Medford high jayvee track team swamped a similar group of boys from Ashland high in a dual track meet yesterday afternoon at Ashland. The score was 83 to 39.

Medford took nine firsts, eight seconds and nine thirds, including four ties for third place. The Black Tornado junior varsity also won the relay.

Ashland took the lead in the first event—the 660-yard run—by winning a first and a third but the Tornado captured first and second in the next event—the 70-yard high hurdles—and from then on Medford led.

Corvallis, Apr. 27—Oregon State, currently tied with Washington State for top spot in the northern division, will embark this week on the annual baseball road trip into Idaho and Washington.

The Beavers upon the road slate against Idaho at Moscow Friday and Saturday, then move over to Pullman for a pair against the defending champion Cougars next Monday and Tuesday. They conclude the long trip with a return series against Washington at Seattle on May 4 and 5.

Fish License Cost Reduced

Salem, Ore., Apr. 27—(U.P.)—War veterans' disabilities of 25 per cent or more may buy Oregon fishing or hunting licenses for 50 cents, the department of veterans' affairs was advised today.

Veterans may buy a combination fishing-hunting license for one dollar.

Application is made through the game commission headquarters in Portland. Forms are available from the commission or from county veterans' service officers, county clerks and the state veterans' department in Salem or in Portland.

Those who received the special licenses last year need only submit their old licenses as evidence, the game commission said.

New applicants must first obtain a disability statement from the veterans administration regional office in Portland, then submit a witness' notarized statement as to residence, along with the evidence of disability.

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West Takes Oregon Golf Open Champ

Portland, Ore., Apr. 27—(U.P.)—Portland golf professional Harold West won the 1950 Oregon open golf tournament here yesterday with a three under par 285 for 72 holes.

West took an early lead in the open and never did fall behind as he won his second state championship in three years. He was trailed in second place by Ed "Porky" Oliver of Seattle who got a one under par 287.

Congdon Places Third

Chuck Congdon of Tacoma finished third with a par 288. All the remaining 64 players trailed by a number of strokes behind the three leaders.

Top amateur in the open was fifth place Bob Duden of Eastmoreland in Portland with a card of 293. Emery Zimmerman of Portland took fourth with 292.

The win gave West \$450 prize money for his efforts. Oliver got \$300, and Congdon \$170.

Rogues Gain New Players

Oregon State Trackmen Host WSC on Saturday

Eugene, Apr. 27—Track and field performances in the northern division improved at the end of the second week of competition. Six new seasonal records were posted and another tied as Oregon thumped Washington State and Oregon State defeated Idaho.

Oregon's victory over the Cougars left the 1950 dual meet championship race with only the Huskies and Washington still undefeated.

This Saturday the Huskies meet Idaho at Seattle and Washington State is at home for Oregon State. Oregon will have a small squad at the Drake Relays and Montana is idle.

Mountain Lakes Open For Fishing Reported

The following is a summary of trout openings for Cascade lakes within national forest boundaries:

Lakes within the Willamette and Mount Hood national forests except those in Wasco and Jefferson counties open to fishing on June 1. Wasco and Jefferson county lakes in the Mount Hood national forest including Badger, Clear, Frog, Green and Ollalie open May 1.

Rock Creek reservoir near Wamie will also open May 1. Cascade lakes located in the Deschutes, Umpqua and Rogue River national forests open May 1 with the exception of several lakes. Major exceptions are Paulina, East and Diamond lake, which will open June 1.

South Twin lake in the Deschutes national forest opens June 15. Fish, Buckeye, Cliff and Twin lakes in the Umpqua national forest open June 1.

Regardless of whether the trout openings are early or late, it is well to remember that many of the mountain lakes will be inaccessible until the middle of June because of excessive snowfall this past winter.

Forest road openings should be checked before scheduling fishing trips to any of the high lakes this spring.
