Pi Beta Phi, founded April 28, 1867, was the first national women's fraternity in this nation. In those first days after the Civil War, higher education among women was still a rarity and it is remembered that women students at Monmouth college, Monmouth, Ill., where the group was founded, were required to enter through special door marked "Door for women."

The group persisted, however, and a second chapter was founded within a year. Pi Beta Phi now has over 50,000 members and 97 chapters throughout this country and Canada, and 236 alumnae clubs. The sorority is dedicated to service, a purpose exemplified in the Settlement school at Gatlinburg, Tenn., and many scholarships for women both within and without the sorority.
