Approximately 85 persons attended the wedding and reception. Pink and white blossoms formed the background for the wedding and were used as decorations for the reception.

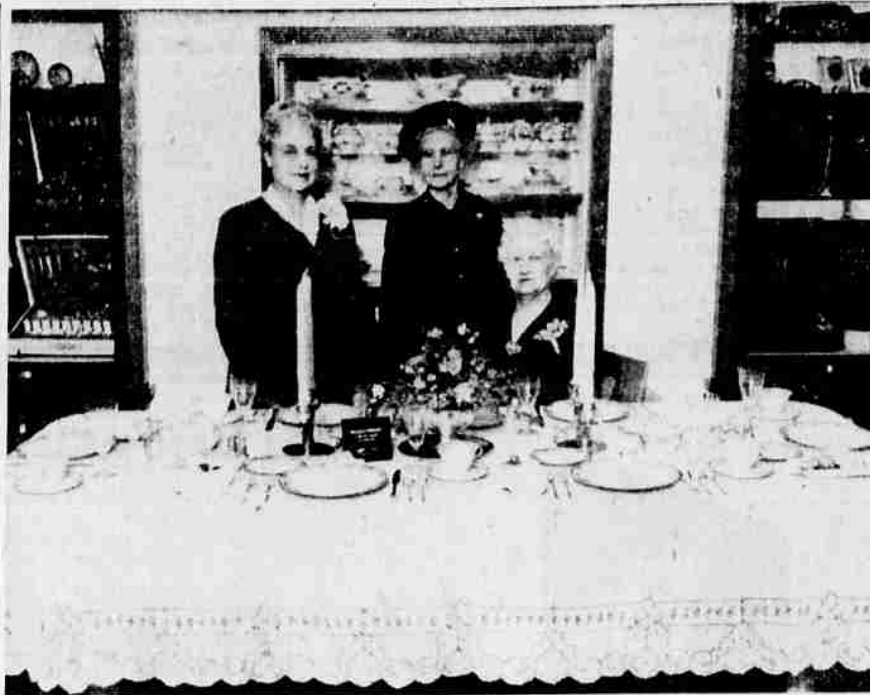
The bride attended Grant high school in Portland and the bridegroom, a graduate of Medford high school, is employed by Scheffel Construction company.

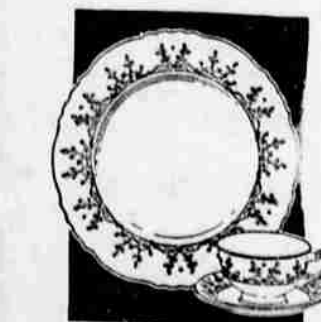

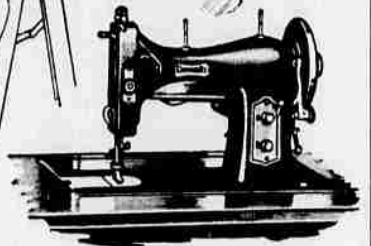

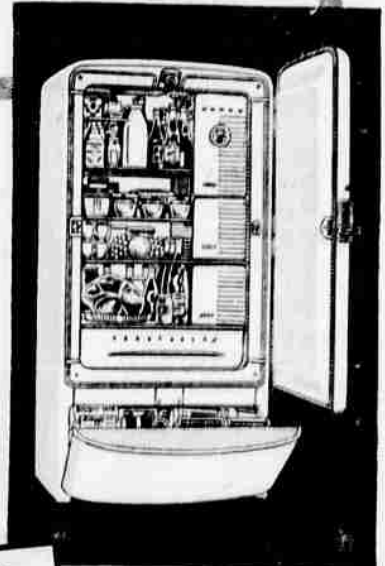
