**Museum Purchases
Voorhies Painting;
Water Color Show**

"The River," a water color by Charles Voorhies, was one of seven works purchased by the Portland Art Museum from the exhibition of the work of the artists of Oregon, 1950. It was announced at the opening.

Another water color, "Sailboats," by Eugene Bennett, also a Medford painter, was included in the exhibition.

Of the 813 works entered, 93 were chosen for the show by a committee of selection consisting of Donald Bear, director of the Santa Barbara Art Museum, Mitchell Jamieson, artist-teacher at the Cornish school in Seattle, and Mark Sponenburgh, sculptor and assistant professor of art at the University of Oregon.

Mr. Voorhies, formerly of Medford now makes his home in Portland and Mr. Bennett, a student at the Art Institute of Chicago, spends his summer in Medford.

Recommendations made at the governor's conference on children and youth services, held in Salem recently, will be reviewed at a meeting set for Monday, May 1, in the Washington school gymnasium. Several Medford persons who attended the conference will speak, and anyone interested is invited.

Sponsoring the gatherings are Mrs. Junior Service League, Medford League of Women Voters, American Association of University Women and the city's P.T.A. units. Speaking will be Mrs. Henry Padgham, Miss Elizabeth McGalliard, Mrs. Marjorie Hopkins, John Richard, Mrs. Ethel Tennant, E. H. Herrick, Miss Frances Clink, Mrs. E. Kanchler of Ashland and Mrs. Blanche Frisbie. Each will cover a separate phase of the conference.

Gov. Douglas McKay called the Oregon meeting in preparation for the mid-century conference to be held in the White House later this year. Purpose of the Washington conference has been outlined in seven phases, and will attract many of the nation's leaders in youth services. The conference has been called to focus attention on the nation's concern for children and youth; to bring together present knowledge about the status of children; point up the needs of parents in providing adequately for children; look at the physical, social, economic and moral environment in which children are growing up; size up the present services for children and youth; examine the ways people are now working together for children, and initiated steps for the achievement of the conference recommendations in the coming decade.

The White House conferences have been held each 10 years.
