

Conventions and Tourist Problems Talked by Group

The tourist and convention committee of the Jackson County Chamber of Commerce met at the Medford hotel yesterday noon for a discussion of the need to promote the Jacksonville museum as the only attraction of its kind in this part of the state, of the Jacksonville Gold Rush jubilee, the Lions club state convention to be held here next month, and of the money businessmen lose by buying "fly-by-night" advertising.

Ron Gandee reported to the committee on the progress being made on new informational folders being printed by the chamber to give "thumbnail" information about the attractions in the Medford area. He said the Jacksonville museum will be featured prominently in the folders and that they should be ready for distribution within two or three weeks.

Many Expected
Dr. Lee Mellish told the committee there may be as many as 900 Lions and their wives here June 11, 12 and 13 for the state convention of Lions International. The Medford club has already received 643 paid reservations. Dr. Mellish said, and every hotel and motel in Medford and in the suburban areas has been booked solid for those three days.

"Scotty" Matheny, of the Jacksonville Lions club, reported that his organization has received inquiries from every state in the union about this year's Jacksonville Gold Rush jubilee. On the final day of last year's jubilee, he said, the little town of Jacksonville was jam-packed with 12,000 visitors. The chief problem this year, according to Matheny, will be housing, and he appealed to the chamber for assistance.

The committee concluded its meeting with a discussion of plans for a tourist host school that would assure an informed citizenry who could more adequately assist tourists in this area who are looking for information. Committee Chairman Ray Clark appointed John Snider and Larry Barnes to handle the details of the school.

Five Soldiers Killed In Highway Accident

Tomah, Wis., May 2—(U.P.)—Five soldiers were killed when their car crashed into a huge automobile transport truck on the western outskirts of town.

Names of the men, who were stationed at Camp McCoy near Sparta, Wis., were withheld by military authorities pending notification of their relatives. The car collided with the trailer on U. S. highway 16. The car was headed eastward toward Tomah and the truck was west-bound.

Top Sheared Off
Sheriff Hans R. Biegel said the force of the collision sheared the top off the car and left twisted wreckage "all over the highway."

"Two of the bodies were mangled so badly that we could barely identify them," Biegel said. "We found one arm 60 feet from the crash."

The driver of the truck, Donald Bellman of Winona, Minn., suffered only minor injuries but was in condition of shock and could not give authorities a clear description of what happened.

"I didn't notice anything out of the ordinary about the car when it was coming at me," he said. "Then it hit and everything happened so fast I can't be sure what went on."

Adler and Draper Counsel Attacks Libel Suit Methods

Hartford, Conn., May 2—(U.P.)—Counsel for entertainers Larry Adler and Paul Draper hit today at what he called an attempt to prove them "guilty by association" of communist leanings.

Attorney Frederick H. Wiggin argued that counsel for Mrs. Hester R. McCullough was using this method while defending the Greenwich housewife in the \$200,000 libel suit brought by the harmonica virtuoso and dancer.

The federal court jury was excused as Wiggin objected to the introduction of literature concerning the Abraham Lincoln school in Chicago, which has been cited by the United States attorney general as an "adjunct of the communist party."

The literature contains the picture of Adler, which he said was used without his permission. Draper, and several other persons who also have been accused of pro-communist leanings. They included Singer, Paul Robeson who, Adler said, "I believe to be pro-communist."

The argument came after Adler testified yesterday that securing milk for babies and money for two hospitals was his chief concern when he played for the joint anti-fascist refugee committee which had been cited by the attorney general as being a "communist front."

Youth Takes Own Life To Evade Deportation

Portland, Ore., May 2—(U.P.)—A 16-year old alien youth believed to be either Australian or Canadian killed himself in a room at the downtown YMCA today rather than face deportation to his native land.

Police identified the victim as Gregory Spencer Moosa, who arrived here April 19 from Los Angeles and apparently was an employee of a motor service company. Officers said Moosa returned to his room at the YMCA about 5 a.m. after a drinking party and was found a short time later in a pool of blood on his bed. A .22 caliber rifle lay across his legs.

Roommate Unaware
A roommate, Donald L. Gammong, was sleeping in another bed and apparently was unaware of Moosa's death until awakened. "If I kill myself notify Mrs. Carol, I love you," read a note found under the body.

It was written on the back of a letter addressed to Moosa from the immigration service and notified him that his application for an extension of his stay in this country had been denied.

Biggest Crowd Attends Open House at Talent
