Ben Stafford to Head 'Hoover for Senator' Group

Col. Ben Stafford was named chairman of the Jackson county branch of the "Hoover for Senator" committee at a meeting of Hoover adherents here last yesterday. About 20 local men met with James A. Rodman, state campaign committee chairman, and John Durr, Eugene, who were here on Hoover's behalf.

Col. O. L. Overmyer was named secretary-treasurer of the local organization, members reported. Headquarters for the committee will be established in the lobby of the Medford hotel.

Describes Progress
Rodman, who is a former state chairman of the Republican Central committee, described progress in the anti-Morse fight being waged by Dave Hoover, Lane county dairyman, who is seeking the republican nomination for United States senator, John McBride, Portland, the third republican candidate.

Rodman said that Young Republicans, particularly in Klamath and Douglas counties, are joining the list of Hoover supporters, and that Klamath Falls republicans are particularly enthusiastic about Hoover's candidacy.

In Portland, it was indicated today that a debate between Hoover and Morse on various aspects of the campaign is being arranged.

Elm Spray for Aphis Advised by Agent

Now is a good time for home owners to spray their elm trees for aphid control, County Agent C. B. Cordy said today. If the trees are not sprayed before the leaves begin to curl, the pests will escape the black leaf 40 that should be used for effective control. If the aphids are left unsprayed they will cause "leaf" to curl and turn red and are responsible for the drip of "honey" from elm trees during the summer.
