

Nazarene District Assembly To Open Here Wednesday

The annual district assembly of the Oregon-Pacific district of the Church of the Nazarene convenes at the Medford Church of the Nazarene on Wednesday at 9 a.m. Addresses of welcome will be given by Mayor Diamond Flynn, the Rev. Meredith Groves, president of the Medford Ministerial association, and the local pastor, the Rev. P. J. Bartram.

Dr. Weaver W. Hess, Portland, is the district superintendent. The presiding officer of the assembly will be Dr. Hardy C. Powers, Dallas, Tex., general superintendent.

In his administrative duties as one of the general superintendents of the church, Dr. Powers travels extensively in supervising and planning the extension of the work in foreign fields, as well as in the United States and Canada. In a recent trip of this nature he visited the mission field of the church in Africa. This was preceded by an extensive tour of the work in Central and South America and the British West Indies.

In addition to his work as general superintendent, Dr. Powers is also the sponsor of the Nazarene Young People's society, a world-wide fellowship of the young people of the church. It is this organization, under Dr. Power's sponsorship, that is largely responsible for the opening of the Church of the Nazarene in Australia. On a recent trip to Japan he visited leaders on several of the islands and interviewed Gen. Douglas MacArthur on the future of the work.

Rally Stated
Dr. Powers will speak at 7:30 p.m. today in a missionary rally at the Church of the Nazarene. He will bring messages to the assembly at 9:00 a.m. Wednesday, Thursday and Friday mornings. About 250 delegates and friends are in attendance for the assembly, from the 50 churches of the district. According to the Rev. Mr. Bartram, friends are cordially invited to all sessions of the assembly. The church is located on the corner of Holly and First streets.

The Rev. George Coulter, district superintendent of northern California, will be the speaker at evening services Wednesday evening, following the district church school rally at 7:30 p.m., which will be conducted by the Rev. Orville Jenkins.

Accordion Band Back From Washington Trip

The Eve Prentice Accordion band returned Monday from Olympia, Wash., where they took part in the Olympia Centennial celebration. Highlighting the trip was the participation of the band in the parade Saturday morning. The entire parade took nearly three hours to pass the reviewing stand.

Sunday morning the band was featured in an hour's program in downtown Centralia, Wash.

Kaiser-Frazer Reduces Price on '51 Kaiser Models

Detroit, May 9—(UP)—Kaiser-Frazer corporation today announced reductions up to \$96 on several of its 1951 Kaiser models.

KF made the announcement as its new 12-model line was unveiled in showrooms. It was the company's second price slash since 1948.

The greatest cut of \$96 was made on the four-door deluxe model, which now sells at \$2,999.

Walter P. DeMartini, vice-president in charge of sales, said KF has lowered prices on all models in the 1951 Kaiser line. The models include for the first time standard and deluxe club and business coupes, two-door sedans, and two and four-door utility sedans.

Prices range from \$1,889 for the business coupe to \$2,999 for the deluxe four-door, with hydraulic transmission available as optional equipment.

KF said the name of its forthcoming low-priced car and winners of its \$200,000 "name-the-car" contest would be announced tomorrow. Production of the new model will start next month, and the low-priced sedan will be on sale in August.

DeMartini said KF's Willow Run plant has been tooled for production of more than 300,000 vehicles annually.

Ashland, May 9—Ashland City Councilman Fred Homes Monday told the Ashland Tidings that under no circumstances would he accept the office of mayor.

Mayor Tom Williams and Councilman Elmer Sheldon are targets of a recall election, to be held at the same time as the May 19 primary election, and Homes had been discussed as a possible successor to Williams should the recall succeed.

"I would positively refuse to serve in the office if nominated," Homes said. "It is my aim to continue serving as a duly elected councilman to the best of my ability regardless of the outcome of the election, and to act in the best interests of the city," he concluded.
