Love for Oysters Betrays Raccoons On South Beaches

Raleigh, N.C.—(U.P.)—If a raccoon around here could list his problems, number one probably would be oysters.

Yet the 'coons along the North Carolina coast, who are the same as any other 'coons more or less, just can't resist. They are fools for fresh oysters.

Usually content to lie up all day, these sly animals have a weakness for seafood that proves to be their downfall.

Mr. 'coon waits until the tide is low along the marsh and then ventures out onto the oyster beds for a snack. That's where his trouble begins.

Hunters lie in wait for live 'coons, lie in wait and turn the dogs loose just as the 'coon begins his meal. Exposed and far from his hiding place, the 'coon usually finds himself tied in a gunny sack and on the way to market before he can swallow the first mouthful.

Experienced 'coon-catchers say it's ticklish business. The dogs are baited as are the hands of the hunters. Heavy gloves are used, but even so, a vicious 'coon usually causes scars. The trick is to get the prey inside the gunny sack before the dogs kill him.

Raccoon hunters say the dogs gradually come to realize that the object is to take them alive and cooperate by surrounding the animal and waiting until the hunters come on the scene.

Some Get Trapped

Even more ironic is the dreary fate which befalls other 'coons who crave the taste of oyster meat. Going onto the oyster beds just after the tide has receded, the 'coon finds the oyster open.

If he incautiously places a foot in one of the gawny shells, it immediately closes and traps him. The harder the 'coon pulls, the tighter becomes the grip of the oyster.

Then the tide rises and the trapped 'coon is drowned.

THE LADY WAS CHAGRINED

I've talked myself into a spot again, and now I must try to get out of it without doing any serious harm. Symptoms have no place in a health column. People should not refer to, mention or tell their symptoms when they write to me for information or advice. Symptoms scare me—in a letter. When a correspondent includes a brief summary of his or her symptoms, no matter how he or she words it, the request is for a diagnosis or a prescription—that is, for medical advice—and I have only one answer for such requests, if they are at all: Consult a physician. Or if that seems unsuitable then I regret it is impossible to form an opinion without having examined the patient etc. etc.

The characteristic symptoms and signs of exophthalmic goiter besides the wide, staring, more or less protruding or bulging eyes—in mild cases the exophthalmos is sometimes misinterpreted as "large," beautiful eyes—are tachycardia or rapid heart action; a fine tremor, most noticeable in the fingers when the patient sews, writes or does other fine work; and, as I hate to say here, generally an assortment of disturbances or complaints commonly described as "nervousness," period.

In a talk about "nerves" or "nervousness" here recently I tried to arm you poor geeks against being exploited by medical merchants who string glibly customers along with "shots" and "sedatives" for their "nerves" instead of finding out what, if anything, ails them and treating it or refusing to cater to their craving for drugs. The following letter is typical of the reaction this article produced:

"I read with interest, and may I say chagrined, your article on 'nervousness.' Perhaps it was of special interest to me, as I have recently undergone operation for toxic thyroid. . . For your enlightenment I will describe 'excessive nervousness'—you said everybody knows what

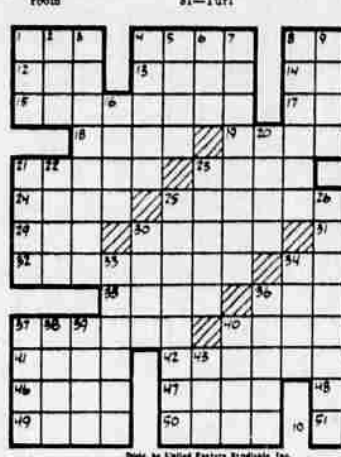
