

Outstanding High School Track Talent to Show Here Saturday

Most of the outstanding high school track talent in Oregon will be on display Saturday morning and afternoon at the Medford high school field when the annual district class A meet is held. Coach Bob Newland of the Tornado reminded local sports fans today.

Spectators attending either or both the morning and afternoon events must enter through the new grandstand. The old stand will be closed to spectators with the area being used by boys taking part in the meet.

Jack Cummings, grounds-keeper for the high school grounds, said yesterday that the track will be in the best condition it has ever been in. With this in mind many observers believe new records will be set Saturday.

Preliminaries will start at 10 a.m. with the high hurdles, shot put and broad jump starting things off. Finals in the afternoon will open at 3 o'clock.

Newland pointed out several events that will be among the best and closest matched for fans to see.

He cited the probable high hurdles duel between Medford's Frank Morris and Corkey of Klamath Falls, both of whom have covered the distance in 15.48.

Newland also suggested that fans keep their eyes peeled for a duel in the shot put. He said this all-around athlete of the Grizzlies has heaved the shot 48 feet.

The discus duel between Klamath's Schubert, Medford's D. C. Mills and Ashland's Lange was also listed as one of the top-notch events on the card.

Rumor has it that the Medford 880-yard relay team consisting of Lou Bittle, Bill Pruitt, Jack Morris and Bill Buckingham is firmly determined to break the district record. The four local youths have run it already this year in 1m 30.5s which is under the state mark of 1m 31.2s set by Medford in 1948.

There will be plenty of room for spectators Saturday morning and afternoon.
