Contest To Raise Funds for Bigger Ambulance Motors

Mersey Flights Inc., operators of Jackson county's non-profit air ambulance, today announced the opening of a contest to raise \$1,200 for the purchase of more powerful engines for the aircraft.

The plane, which has taken a number of ill or injured persons to Portland hospitals for emergency treatment, is in good condition, the group said, but pilots feel that additional power for the ship would give an extra margin of safety and service which the unique project should have.

Prize to be awarded to the contest winner will be a free round-trip to Portland for two persons via West Coast airlines. Contest Rules Told

Here is the way the contest works:
Those who mail a donation of \$1 or more to Mersey Flights Inc., P. O. Box 522, Medford, may make a request for a selection to be played over one of two KYJC programs—Platter Party from 11 p.m. to 12 midnight each day, Monday through Saturday, or Rise 'n' Shine from 6 to 7 a.m. In addition, they may submit their estimate as to the number of donations which will be necessary to complete the \$1,200 campaign. The estimate closest to the number will win the prize.

The contest begins immediately, according to George Milligan, chairman of the Mersey Flight group.
