McMinnville Approves Half-Million Budget

McMinnville, Ore., May 13 (U.P.)—McMinnville school district No. 40 voted yesterday to approve a budget of \$549,989, largest school operating fund in the history of the community. In light voting tallied last night the measure carried 315 to 235, an 80 vote margin. Officials had warned that school operations would be curtailed 50 per cent if the measure failed.

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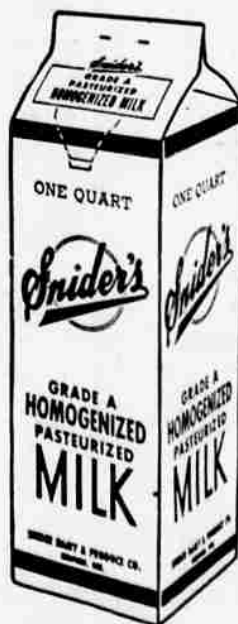
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
