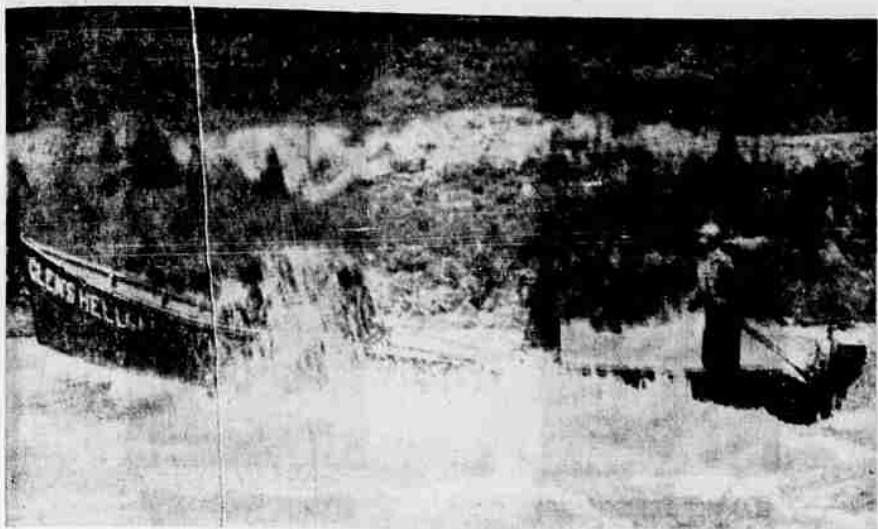

One-Day Tours Down Rogue New Plan of Veteran River Guide Glen Woolridge

Grants Pass, May 13.—Another feature which may attract adventure-seeking tourists to southern Oregon has been announced by a well-known Grants Pass riverman and guide.

Glen Woolridge is best known for guide services down the Rogue river for fishermen. Now, with special equipment, he has inaugurated a new type of boat tour for sightseers. Instead of the usual five-day fishing trip into the primitive wilds of the lower Rogue, Woolridge will offer a one-day tour from Grants Pass to Grants Pass, 25 miles away.

Boat Specially Designed

The tours are made in a boat specially designed and built by the famous river guide to accommodate a party of six. The craft

is powered with a 33-horsepower motor built by the Evinrude company just for navigation of the vicious Rogue rapids. The motor features an unusually long rudder stick that allows Woolridge to stand at the back of the boat while guiding it through the tricky rapids. The propeller was

Farm Land Price Now Steady, Agency Says

Washington, May 13.—(U.P.)—The price of farm land has stopped skidding, at least temporarily, the agriculture department said today.

The department said in a report the national average value of farm real estate was one per cent higher in March than last November. It attributed the rise to "slightly higher prices for many farm products and improvement in general business conditions."

It said the national average value of farm real estate in March was 169 per cent of the 1912-14 average, five per cent lower than the November, 1948, record high of 177 per cent.

ARCHITECT DIES

Portland, Ore., May 13.—(U.P.)—Frederick Aandahl, 62, noted Portland architect, died at Emanuel hospital last night after a coronary illness of 10 days. A native of Norway, Aandahl was president of the Oregon chapter of the American Institute of Architects in 1935-36. Emanuel hospital where he died was one of his designs.

Ashland's Plaza Cafe Redecorated, Reopen

Ashland, May 13.—The Plaza cafe, owned and operated by Mr. and Mrs. Raymond Guise, has recently undergone extensive remodeling, and is again open for business. Walls have been resurfaced, floors laid in diagonal candy stripes, and murals and custom-made chandeliers feature the walls. Table coverings of red leather trimmed with white, and six chandeliers of candle-armed copper topped with specially-made shades are also featured.

Murals show an early stage coach, Oregon's first steamboat and locomotive.

The exterior of the restaurant has been redesigned to use Ne-tach glassing stripping.

Philip Henselman, Medford artist-designer, was in charge of material correlation and color styling and designed the chandeliers and the murals.

Of interest to early residents of the valley is the contemporary use of a pioneer theme as the Plaza has been in operation since the 1890's, at which time it was known as the Palace of Sweets.

State Challenges State On Fire Prevention

Salem, Ore., May 13.—(U.P.)—The state of Oregon challenged the state of Washington today to a forest fire prevention contest this year.

Gov. Douglas McKay of Oregon asked Gov. Arthur B. Langlie of Washington to send a representative to discuss contest details at the annual Keep Oregon Green banquet in Portland Monday night. Governor McKay said:

"I think it only fitting that the two states which initiated Keep Green programs should vie in a contest that will further emphasize the great importance of combatting the forest fire menace."

Governor McKay said 189 reservations for the banquet have been received, including those from virtually all Keep Oregon Green county chairmen.

Two Killed in Crash Of Light Airplane

Elma, Wash., May 13.—(U.P.)—Two persons were killed last night when their two-seat Aerona plane crashed in a field one-half mile south of here, the state patrol reported.

The victims were identified as pilot Carol A. W. Spaulding, 52, and Richard Koch, 27, both of Elma.

State patrolmen said the plane's engine apparently failed as it came in low over the field. Spaulding was killed instantly. Koch died a few minutes after the crash.
