New York, May 17—(U.P.)—Stocks advanced to four-year highs in the general average today and industrials reached their best level in nearly 20 years.

Trading increased on the recovery which was at its best shortly after mid-session when a move to cut the capital gains tax and reduce the holding period for tax purposes brought in considerable investment buying. Dow Jones closing stock averages: 30 industrials 220.60, up 0.90; 20 railroads 56.57, up 0.13; 15 utilities 43.82, up 0.17; 65 stocks 78.08, up 0.29.

Sales amounted to 2,020,000 shares, compared with 1,730,000 shares yesterday.
