The hostess prize was won by Mrs. Leona Gilinsky.

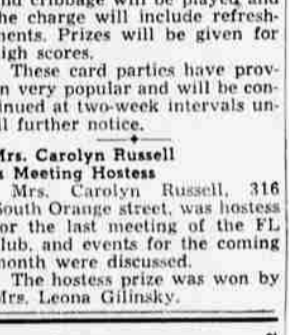
## Phoenix Homemakers Plan Supper Friday

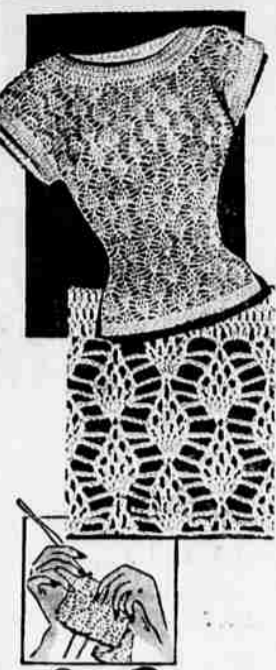
