Wall Street

New York, May 18 — (U.P.) — High caliber investment demand and a mild increase in speculative buying lifted the stock market to new four year highs in its general average today.

Trading lightened from yesterday's pace. Some profit-taking went ahead in isolated issues. Industrials continued to lead and their average set a new high since Sept. 24, 1930. Ralls eased a few cents but would have been up a trifle had not Great Northern sold ex-dividend. Utilities were at their best since Nov. 9, 1931.

Dow-Jones closing stock averages: 30 industrials 220.83 up 0.03; 10 railroads 56.53 off 0.04; 15 utilities 44.04 up 0.22; 65 stocks 78.14 up 0.06.

Sales today amounted to 1,770,000 shares compared with 2,020,000 shares traded yesterday.

Margaret Lydiard Taken by Death; Funeral Private

Mrs. Margaret Dunlap Lydiard of Medford passed away at her home, 17 South Peach street, Wednesday afternoon. Funeral services, to be held at Perl funeral home, will be private and the family has asked that no flowers be sent.

Mrs. Lydiard was born in Upper Stewiacke, Nova Scotia, July 30, 1860. After completing preparatory work and graduating from normal school in Truro, N.S., she removed to Minnesota and taught in the public schools there until her marriage in 1882 to Joseph Howe Lydiard of Long Lake.

Five Children Survive

After removal to Oregon in 1909, the family home for many years was at Table Rock and the last few years has been in Medford. Mrs. Lydiard's husband and a son, William H., preceded her in death.

Surviving are five children: Miss Grace Lydiard, Stanley Lydiard, Mrs. G. Roy Ringo and Mrs. Berthold Barnum, all of Medford and Mrs. Frank B. Marsh of Sierra Madre, Cal. Other survivors are nine grandchildren and five great-grandchildren.

Forbidden Initials Uttered by Teacher

Edinburg, Tex., May 18 — (U.P.) — A south Texas school superintendent showed no feeling of remorse today after using the initials "S. O. B." to slap back at critics.

Scholarly R. P. Ward sputtered the forbidden initials yesterday in an argument at a school board meeting with a teacher he had fired.

The superintendent resented reports his district was subscribing to "Soviet Press," a translation of Russian news stories.

"Anyone who said the school is an exponent in any way of communism is a rotten S. O. B.," Ward said. "I want my remarks to go on the record like that and I'll not retract a word of it."

18 School Districts Approve 1950 Budget

Out of 19 rural school districts who have filed returns on last Monday's special election to exceed the six per cent limitation in the budget of the rural school board, 18 have reported, unofficially, that the proposal passed.

The only district opposing expenditures in excess of the limitation was the West Side school district, but the size of the vote in the other districts is expected to give the equalized county-wide budget final approval.

There are seven districts yet to report and the rural board will not know the final results until next week.
