Snead Wins West Open

Los Angeles, May 22—(U.P.)—Sam Snead left for Ft. Worth, Tex., today with \$2,600 first prize money after narrowly escaping a three-way playoff by sinking a "tough" two-foot putt on the last hole of the 47th Western Open golf championship.

Snead, White Sulphur Springs, W. Va., birdied the 14th hole and parred the last four to defend his western title with a 72-hole score of 282.

Just a stroke behind at 283 were E. J. (Dutch) Harrison of Little Rock, Ark., and Jim Ferrer of San Francisco, each of whom held the lead briefly during the final round as Snead flizzed away a three-stroke lead and then rallied his game to win.

Harrison could have tied by winning a five-foot putt on the 18th, but missed for a bogie.

Bing Crosby Golf Loser

St. Andrews, Scotland, May 22—(U.P.)—Willie Turnesa of Elmsford, N. Y., the tournament favorite, advanced through the opening round of the British amateur golf tournament today but Crooner Bing Crosby was eliminated by J. K. Wilson of Scotland, 3 and 2.

Turnesa, who won the title in 1947 and lost in the finals last year, defeated a fellow-American, James Knott of Palm Beach, Fla., 5 and 3.

If Crosby hadn't been playing Turnesa's match would have drawn the largest gallery, but Willie had to play second fiddle to the crooner.

Turnesa did not lose a hole. He won the second, eighth and ninth and was three up at the turn. He took the 13th and 14th to close out the match.
