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Pan-Am Highway Goes Just So Far Then Peters Out

Mexico City (UP)—The famed Pan American Highway finally is nearing completion in Mexico but it's a "road to nowhere."

It ends abruptly in the jungles at the Guatemalan border. Sixty miles away in Guatemala lies the next stretch of the great continental roadway. Until the Guatemalan government appropriates a new road-building funds, tourists who plan to motor into Central America simply will have to wait.

Neither Mexico or Guatemala has any hope of connecting their terminals of the projected Alaska-to-Arentina highway this year.

Road Goes Nowhere
The strange situation of a road that goes nowhere was created, Mexican engineers claim, when they were asked by Guatemala to lay their section of the highway to a tiny border village named El Ocotal.

One Guatemalan road already stretched to the frontier at Tapachula, only a few miles from the Pacific coast. Mexico originally had planned to join its 2,200 miles of paved and graded all-weather Pan American highway to the Tapachula roadhead.

However, the road linking Tapachula and Guatemala City is passable only in dry weather, and Guatemalans apparently hoped to open an additional northern route into their country via El Ocotal rather than improve the mountainous, dangerous southern route.
