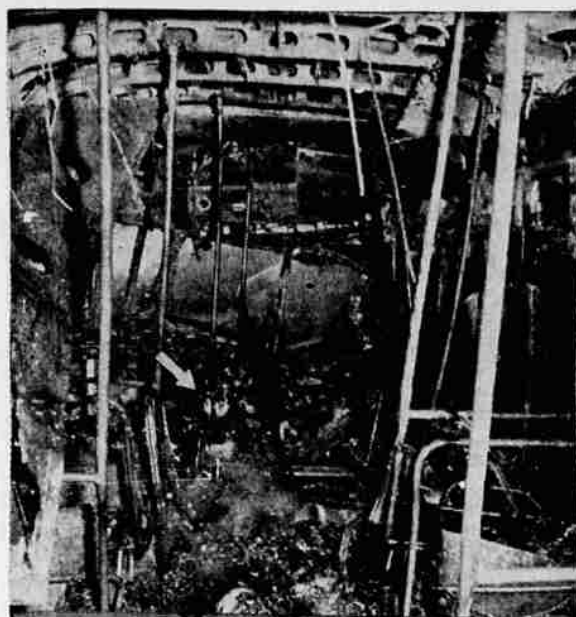

Prison Made Attractive
Grosch keeps an average of 500 prisoners, some for as long as two years in his prison. He has the walls painted in orchid and blue, the floors waxed and flowered drapes over the bars, because he believes a model jail helps reform prisoners.

Roosevelt, Warren Anxiously Wait Outcome of California Primary Vote

Sacramento, June 2—(UPI)—New York born James Roosevelt and native son Earl Warren worried today which way California's 1,250,000 new voters would go in the state primary election next Tuesday.

Roosevelt and Warren are seeking nomination for the state governorship. Roosevelt is a democrat and Warren, now in his second term as governor, is a republican. But they are competing directly against each other for both democratic and republican nominations.

50 Per Cent Gain
The state has gained around 4 million new residents since 1940, a gain of more than 50 per cent. Since 1942, 1,250,000 new persons have become elig-

ible to vote, 900,000 of them since 1946.

Roosevelt hopes they vote the way they did before they came here, because a fair majority of them apparently are democrats. And Warren hopes they fit into the usual California pattern of voting democratic in national elections and republican for state candidates.

There has been no real test of the effect on the migration to California on the state voting habits. In 1946 Warren swept both republican and democratic nominations in the primary and had no opposition when the heavier voting of the general

election came along.

Republicans Get Votes
Republican candidates for other state offices piled up good majorities that year in such "rapid growth" areas as the San Joaquin valley. But two years later the same valley went for Truman and ousted a republican congressman.

One theory is that the newcomers will give Roosevelt their sympathy. He established California residence in 1938 and there have been attacks on him—though not by Warren—as a carpetbagger.

Warren Has Background
On the other hand, there's a theory that the newest Californian is the most vociferous Californian and will vote for a native-born man. Warren has background in three of the most important areas of the state. He was born in Los Angeles, grew up in the San Joaquin valley and went to school and worked in the San Francisco bay area.

Democrats have outnumbered republicans in the state for 20 years. Right now there are about three democrats to each two republicans. The ratio was about the same in 1942, indicating newcomers have also registered in that ratio.
