

Talent Student 3rd in National Steno Contest

Talent, June 2—Virginia Peters, graduating senior of Talent high school, has won third place in the 100 words per minute division of the 1950 national commercial contests sponsored each year by the Teaching Aids Exchange. More than 200 schools, representing 41 states, entered slightly less than 6,000 students. A silver medal was awarded to Miss Peters at commencement on May 31. Other senior girls placing and receiving certificates of proficiency in this division were Eloise Roberts, 17th, and Ethel Trimble, dictation-transcription certificate only.

In shorthand I, 60 words per minute division, Jean Avery placed 14th; Edna Peters, 25th; Lily Welburn, 30th. Those receiving theory certificates only were Lois Zickelose and Patricia Zemke.

Certificates of proficiency were won by two typing I students: Donna Schulz and Marilyn Eagle.

Talent high school has been entering this nationwide contest for the past four years and had another winner in 1947 when a senior girl took second place in typing.

This year Talent high ranked tenth in points scored in the shorthand division of the contest, although in competition with schools many times its size. Commercial subjects are taught by Mrs. R. B. Parr.

Park Pool Operating Facts, Rules Listed

Facts and rules on operation of the new Hawthorne park swimming pool were outlined today by Norman Worthley, pool manager and head lifeguard.

Starting Monday, June 5, the pool will be open for business seven days a week from 10 a.m. to 9 p.m. for regular swimming. Admission prices will be 20 cents for children eight through 15 years of age and 40 cents for persons 16 years and above.

Starting June 19 swimming classes will be offered to beginners and intermediates from 8 to 10 a.m. Monday through Friday. Children eight to 16 years of age may register for the classes at the Red Cross office or at the pool. Worthley reported. There will be no charge except the regular pool admission price.

May Teach Adults
If there is sufficient demand, adult classes will be arranged for evenings.

Worthley said that a meet to determine city swimming and diving champions is planned for some time in July. Later it is hoped to arrange meets with Klamath Falls, Roseburg and other communities.

Daily schedule at the pool will include an organized and supervised play period of water games for all classes of swimmers.

Jean Dean and Dick Camden will be the other life guards at the pool, assisting Worthley who will also have charge of the wading pools and playground facilities.

There will be no admission charge to the wading pools but youngsters using them will not have access to the pool locker rooms. Wading pool water will be chlorine-treated the same as the swimming pool.

Cooperation Asked
Worthley stressed the desire of the pool staff to keep the pool appearance in the same condition it will be for dedication day. He has asked for cooperation from the public in abiding by pool rules and regulations to ascertain safety and full enjoyment at the facility.

He listed the following rules: Health:

1. Do not enter the pool if suffering a skin rash, disease or cold or if wearing any type of bandage.
2. A soap shower is compulsory before entering the pool. (The guards will check each swimmer.)
3. Do not spit in pool.
4. Do not eat or smoke in the pool area.

Safety:

1. No running.
2. Stay out of diving area unless diving.
3. Do not push swimmers into pool.
4. Obey the guards and all signs.

Sergeant Convicted Of Rape, Murder

San Francisco, June 2—(U.P.)—The government said today that the honor of Wac Sgt. Fairy E. Decker was "vindicated" by a jury verdict finding Air Force Sgt. Lyle H. Buswell guilty of raping and murdering her.

An all-male jury returned a verdict after deliberating six and one-half hours last night. The jurors recommended leniency for the 33-year-old Pacific war veteran. The government had asked for the death penalty.

The jury found Buswell guilty of second degree murder; guilty of murder in the course of rape with recommendation for leniency; and guilty of rape on a government reservation.

Buswell admitted strangling Sgt. Decker at the Hamilton field, Cal., air base March 23 on a "drunken impulse," the climax of a spree that began when he learned he was going overseas.

Paralyzed Man
Receives Diploma

Canby, Ore., June 2—(U.P.)—George Nelson, 32, of Canby, was crippled in a swimming accident 18 years ago, but despite his handicap George is probably Canby's most cheerful citizen according to neighbors.

George was happier than ever last night because he received his diploma from Canby high school after a 15-year wait.

The balding Oregonian was paralyzed from the neck down in 1932 at the age of 14, but his handicap has not kept him from making a mark in the world.

Nelson gathers news for the local newspaper, sells greeting cards, takes magazine subscriptions and even finds time to teach a Sunday school class.

After a long lapse, the "cheerful" cripple returned to his studies two years ago. With straight "1" marks in music, mathematics, biology and journalism, the school board voted him a diploma which he received with the rest of Canby's graduating class last night.
