GIs Attending Summer School Cautioned

Veterans planning to attend summer school under the "GI Bill" should start making necessary arrangements now, the veterans administration cautioned Saturday.

First, they should determine whether their VA certificates of eligibility are in order. And, if eligibility are in order. And, if should learn from VA whether they will be required to undergo advisement and guidance.

A veteran who is now in school and who intends to continue this summer in the same school and the same course need merely register at his school. His present certificate of eligibility, on file with the VA, is sufficient.

May Change Schools

But if he wants to continue in the same course but at a different school, he should apply at once for a supplemental certificate of eligibility at his nearest VA office. On his application, he must list the name of the new school and name of course. The application should be sent to the VA regional office having jurisdiction over his present school.

If the veteran plans to take a different course this summer, either in his present school or at another school, he will have to apply for a supplemental certificate of eligibility.

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City Budget in Ashland To Be Under Limitation

Ashland, June 3—J. B. Austin, Ashland city recorder and budget director, said this week the city budget committee has decided to keep the Ashland budget for the coming fiscal year within the constitutional six per cent limitation on increases, and that no election to approve an excess will be needed.

The increase allowed by the constitution will permit the budget to be \$2,000 larger than the current one, Austin reported at a joint meeting of the city council and the citizens' budget committee. If it is found that additional funds are needed, a bond issue election will be held in the fall, he said.

Increasing tax delinquency has been noted this year, Austin said, and reported that only \$51,000 has been paid on total taxes levied of some \$67,000. He also noted that tax experts have frequently recommended that total levies should not exceed 60 mills per dollar-value of taxable property. The combined city-school district levy next year will be close to 70 mills, he said.

Close figuring for department heads will be required to keep their budget requests within the limitations, Austin said.
