Today is circus day, with the famed Clyde Beatty circus scheduling two performances, at 2:30 p.m. and 8 p.m., at the Jackson county fairgrounds. Main gates at the circus grounds were to open at 1:15 and 7 p.m.

Tickets for both performances are on sale at the Mack Drug store, 323 East Main street.

Circus trains were to arrive in Medford early this morning and the unloading process gave early risers an advance glimpse of the show.

New Attractions
The huge spectacle will include many new attractions along with old favorites. There will be 267 performers, acrobats, jugglers, equestrians, aerialists, elephants, horses and clowns. The act of Animal Trainer Clyde Beatty this year

has been described as "suicidal daring."

Featured also will be Harriet Beatty, wife of the trainer; The Great Barton; the Flying Thrillers; the Caudillo Sisters and Frank Doyle, aerialists; the Monzello Troupe, spring board champions; Harrolds and the Voises, comedy aerial bar per-

Building Project To Feature Big Homes

Antony-McIntyre builders are ready to pour the first concrete for the foundation of a \$22,000 home that will be the first of 24 in an exclusive and highly restricted residential development at Ross Lane and Old Stage road.

To be called "Westwood," the newest Antony-McIntyre project to be handled in conjunction with the sales force of Rogue Valley Land company, will rise on a 28-acre tract purchased from E. H. Niedermeyer just across Ross lane from the West Side school. It is in the midst of an old and stately residential area in the foot foothills at the southern edge of the Rogue valley, and the builders say they will conform to the pattern of leisurely

suburban living already established in the neighborhood.

Westwood homes will all be in the \$15,000 to \$25,000 class, with the builders offering permanent maintenance of streets and parkways and complete landscaping of each home included in the contract price. Setbacks, type and size of buildings, and the total number of homes for the full tract are all restricted to assure what Claude and Robert McIntyre and Paul Antony call "protection against any and all value-destroying influences."

The tract has been subdivided into four blocks each with six homesites measuring 195 by 200 feet. The first well in Westwood has been drilled and the builders say they are assured an abundance of water.

Two Firms

The building and sales combine here consists of Robert McIntyre and his father, Claude McIntyre, as Rogue Valley Land company, and Robert McIntyre and Paul Antony as Antony-McIntyre builders. It is the same business arrangement responsible for the Lakewood Village homes on McAndrews road, built according to individual specifications and also restricted.

Antony and the McIntyres say the need and demand for higher cost homes like the Westwood type is becoming more and more evident, occasioned by local desires and the growing influx of retired families into the valley seeking quiet living away from large population centers. They point out that they are interested in the entire development of the area and are determined to make Westwood an asset to the already select nature of west side residences.

Good Weather Is Employment Spur

Good weather conditions spurred the seasonal increase in employment in Jackson county during May, according to the latest report of John J. Patton, manager of the Medford office of the state employment service.

He said there were a few shortages in some skilled and semi-skilled occupations with particular needs felt for sawyers, edgemen and trimmermen as the sawmills increased production.

In spite of steady migration into the area, the number of unemployed decreased, Patton said. At the end of the month, unemployment in the county was estimated at 975, including 200 women and 250 veterans. That was 30 per cent less than one month ago and 15 per cent less than at the end of May, 1949.

Claims Down

The number of unemployment compensation claims is down here to 12 per cent of last winter's high point, and Patton reported that one-third of the present claims are being filed against other states for former residents.

The local office expects no labor shortage in agriculture this season, but the high level of construction activity started during May possibly will create a shortage of building tradesmen later in the year, it is believed. No such shortage has occurred yet, however.

Job placements made through the local office were about 50 per cent greater in May than in April, according to Patton. The peak of employment is normally reached here in September.
