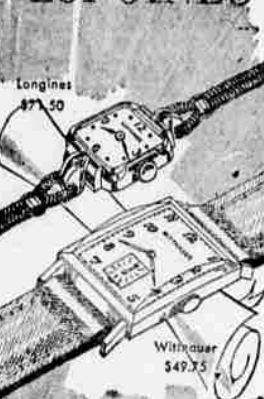
Supper To Be Held Tuesday Evening At Phoenix Center

This will also be annual election of officers. It is hoped by those in charge that the affair will be well attended.

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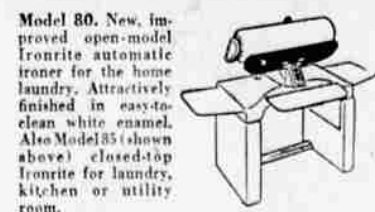
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
