

National Jamboree Group Can Take 2 More Boy Scouts

Vacancies which will permit two more local Boy Scouts to make the trip to the national jamboree at Valley Forge, Pa., this month, have been created by the inability of two registered scouts to make the trip, it was announced today by Dr. Charles Lemery, jamboree chairman of the Crater Lake Area council of the scouts.

There is a possibility that one other vacancy may occur, he said. Scouts wishing to apply for the chance to make the trip should get in touch with Dr. Lemery, or with Cliff Hansen, scout executive, as soon as possible.

Meeting Called

Dr. Lemery has called a meeting for 6:30 p.m. Friday of all jamboree scouts, at which time final plans for troop and patrol organization will be discussed. The meeting will be at scout headquarters. A total of 68 scouts will make the month-long trip east, by way of various scenic attractions. The trip will be made by special train.

The local contingent will leave June 19, and will return July 13. The packs to be carried by the boys, made of yucca fibers, are now being decorated with the Crater Lake council design by Hal Bishop, local artist. Trek carts for patrol and troop equipment are being assembled by scout leaders and volunteers at the E. H. Mann company.

Truman Commends Congress as Foreign Aid Measure Signed

Washington, June 3—(U.P.)—President Truman commended members of congress of both political parties for their passage of the foreign economic assistance act of 1950 as he signed that measure today.

In a formal statement, the president said:

"I have today signed the foreign economic assistance act of 1950. This act is a major contribution to peace and freedom in the world.

"This memorable act is a tribute to the wisdom and vigor of the forward-looking members of the congress of both political parties, of both houses, and particularly to the hard work of the responsible congressional committees.

Forward Authority

"The foreign economic assistance act contains within it the authority to go forward with five programs of foreign aid.

"It authorizes, first, continuation of the European recovery program for a third year.

"It authorizes, second, continued aid to the free peoples of Korea, southeast Asia and non-communist China.

"It makes possible, third, a program of relief and public works for the Arab refugees from Palestine.

"Fourth, it provides legislative authority for going ahead with the program of technical assistance to help build up economically underdeveloped areas, a program which has become known as 'point four.'

"And, finally, it authorizes continuing support for United Nations programs on behalf of children.

Contribute to Purpose

"Each of the five programs authorized in this act will contribute to our purpose of strengthening the cause of freedom, through economic measures which will demonstrate the effectiveness of free institutions in meeting human needs.

"Taken together, they add up to a broad, enlightened and typically American enterprise in the building of a safe and prosperous world.

"Four of these five programs are already under way.

"In the first two years of the European recovery program, with our essential aid, the people of Europe have made great strides in rebuilding their economies. This has enabled them to preserve and strengthen their free institutions, and to deal successfully with the threat of communism on their own soil. They are drawing closer together in common purpose and in common defense. I am confident that this third year of our assistance will give impetus to increasing cooperation by these countries, will add greatly to their collective strength and will bring closer the day when they can contribute on a self-sustaining basis to the economic growth of all free nations.

Considerable Support

"The benefits of American support to independent Korea, non-communist China and certain new countries in southeast Asia have been considerable. Millions of people in Asia have recently become independent.

They see in that independence a chance to work for a better life. We have supported their independence. The economic aid authorized in this act will give them tangible evidence of our continuing friendship and support.

"I am especially glad that the congress has taken action with respect to the problem of the Arab refugees from Palestine. The program authorized in this bill carries out the recommendations of the United Nations economic survey mission for the near east, headed by Mr. Gordon Clapp. This program has been drawn up in the light of the serious problems facing the Palestine refugees, and with the economic potential of the near east in mind. Successful development in this area will make an obvious contribution to the maintenance of peace. To achieve this aim, we shall need the cooperation of other members of the United Nations, who have expressed their interest in the problems of the Arab world. We shall continue, also, on the continued work of private agencies. Government programs will supplement, but not replace, their work.

Familiar With UN Work

"Many Americans have become familiar with the magnificent work of the United Nations on behalf of children whose lives were damaged by war and its aftermath. This act will enable us to support new and permanent arrangements, under which the United Nations can deal with the continuing needs of children. In the meantime, we can give such support to the present emergency fund as may be needed to prevent a lapse in this essential work.

"The major new step forward in this act is the authorization it contains for a program of technical assistance for the underdeveloped areas of the world. The exchange of technical knowledge and skills, and the fostering of capital investment abroad, are not new ideas. They are in line with the American traditions of initiative and free enterprise.

"But we are now ready to put these activities on an organized, sustained basis and to direct them toward the building of a more prosperous and peaceful world. If we can, gradually but steadily, help to replace sickness and health, illiteracy with education, poverty with a higher standard of living, for the millions of peoples who live in underdeveloped areas, we shall make a tremendous contribution to the strength of freedom and the defeat of communist imperialism.

To Assist Nations

"This act will enable us to give, from our abundant store of scientific and technical knowledge, assistance to underdeveloped nations who have the initiative and vigor to help themselves.

"This act authorizes activities by the government. But far more than government action will be required. I look forward to the continued work of the many private groups who have had experience in this field. I look forward to the interest of our young people, whose technical skills can find such important employment in this work. I look forward to expanded business investment in these areas which will be made possible as their economic systems grow in strength and stability. I hope the congress will soon enact the companion measure to this act which will encourage and support such business investment.

"The present act is a memorable step forward in our program for peace. I am confident that the congress will follow through promptly by appropriating the full measure of funds necessary to carry out the programs authorized in this act."

Albany Rose Festival Float Due for Voyage

Albany, Ore., June 3—(U.P.)—Albany's Rose Festival float will be shipped to Portland by water this year. The Albany Junior Chamber of Commerce said the float will be transported down the Willamette river on a barge during a day-long excursion Sunday.

Gov. Douglas McKay will accompany the float at Salem and a delegation from the Rose Festival will meet the float when it docks at Portland Monday morning.

Nova Scotia's Paper Industry Hit by Fire

Halifax, N. S., June 3—(U.P.)—Heavy rains moved toward a raging forest fire today, giving hope to rangers fighting the blaze around the clock that they could save Nova Scotia's pulp and paper industry.

The weather bureau said there was a chance that the rain, moving eastward, would drench the main blaze in the Halifax-Colchester county area and dampen other sections of the province menaced by smaller fires.

The articles will be used for welfare work in this community, it was said. Anyone having contributions and who is not contacted is asked to call Mrs. Ruth Phillips at 2-2786.

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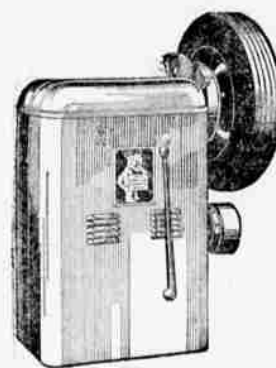
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
