Court Records

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Promotion Brings County Timber's Value Up, Is View

The volume of usable standing timber on Jackson county's forested acres has, in effect, been increased by at least 25 per cent in the past five years, in the opinion of H. V. Simpson, executive vice-president of the West Coast Lumbermen's association.

He said that a nation-wide program of lumber promotion, now in its fourth year, had opened up large new markets for west coast lumber and had made a major contribution to improved forest utilization.

"We have gone directly to the American consumer of lumber," Simpson said, "and told him how to use lower grades of lumber in his home and farm construction, at a saving to him, and yet at no sacrifice of strength and rigidity in his buildings."

Demand Created

"By creating a strong demand for lower grades of lumber," the official stated, "we have made it possible for Jackson county lumbermen to bring in many thousands of additional feet per acre of low grade logs which were once left in the woods for lack of a market. That is forest conservation of the highest order."

"Every one of Jackson county's 88 sawmills and their employees have profited from this national promotion program," Simpson continued. "It has meant additional millions of dollars of income to Jackson county firms."

Sponsor Campaign

"A number of Jackson county lumbermen are sponsoring this national advertising campaign," the lumber executive stated, "by membership in the West Coast association. The time may come when demand for lumber drops off. Then we will need to redouble our efforts to sell west coast lumber in competition with substitutes and other materials. Then we will need the united support of every sawmill in Jackson county."

Simpson cited the \$52,810,000 million-foot estimated output of Jackson county mills in 1949 as one of the county's major economic supports. Lumber as a crop was worth an estimated \$32,179,840 to the county last year in cash income, he said, of which nearly \$16,800,000 was wages.

Auditor Here

He announced that an official of the West Coast Lumbermen's association, Emmett Stoddard, auditor, would be in Jackson county for the next several days calling on local sawmills to tell them of the industry's promotion program.

"We need to have more sawmills contributing financially to this national advertising and promotion of lumber," Simpson urged, "if we are to maintain the high levels of production and employment built up during the past four years. Every sawmill, no matter what its production, should be an active supporter of this program to insure the continuance of a prosperous lumber industry and a prosperous Jackson county."

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Experiment Station Sets Annual Field Day

The second annual field day to be held at the southern Oregon branch experiment station near Talent has been set for Friday, June 23, and is expected to draw hundreds of local business men and ranchers. More than 500 attended last year's event.
