Jackson County Farm Notes

Sprinkler Demonstration At Woody's Farm Friday

All farmers interested in irrigation sprinkler equipment will have an opportunity to see these systems in operation on Friday, June 8, at L. T. Woody's River Banks farm.

The River Banks farm is about 10 miles west of Grants Pass on the Applegate river. Visitors are advised to proceed west to Grants Pass on the Redwood highway until they cross the Applegate river bridge, then turn right on the river road in a northwesterly direction for about one mile. This road runs through the farm. The California Oregon Power Company will have a representative present to discuss electric facilities and rates for pumping water.

All equipment companies that care to display their pumps, sprinkler systems and equipment associated with irrigation are invited to participate.

Arthur F. King, extension conservator from some of the peaches or it will be found that too many fruits have been left on the tree. Peaches can be left in greater numbers on the heavier wood and taken off entirely on ends of the shoots. By doing this you will greatly reduce the amount of dropping and tree bruising that would otherwise be required.

Commercial pear growers will do less thinning than usual this year. The Bartlett crop, which requires the most thinning, is fairly light and only a few orchards will need to be thinned. Anjou have a heavy crop and while the June drop is still in progress, it is anticipated that the crop will continue to be good. However, Anjou trees which produce light crops also produce moderate sized fruit, while trees which produce heavy crops generally produce large sized fruits. If the tree with a heavy crop is thinned, then the size of the fruit will be even larger. This condition seems to be without parallel, as almost always the heavier the crop the smaller the fruit. As the heavy crop of Anjou promises to be large sized fruit, then the only object in thinning would be to save the trees from breaking and to remove frost marred fruit. As good pear prices are expected this fall, it would seem more economical to prop the Anjou trees and to hold up the crop than to spend money to reduce it by thinning.

With all of our fruits it requires 25 to 30 leaves to produce one fruit. While one can't count all of the leaves and the fruits to find out what the ratio is, it is practical to count the leaves on a few small branches. This quickly gives an idea of how many leaves can be left and you can then judge whether or not a tree is overloaded. With a little practice you can learn to estimate the leaves in groups of 5 and 10 so that the counting can be done rapidly. Twenty-five to 30 leaves will produce an average sized fruit, but if larger fruits are desired, then the thinning will have to be a little heavier. It isn't necessary that each fruit be surrounded by the 30 leaves that are required to nourish it. The plant food materials produced in the leaves will move through the wood and be available for fruit production over an area of about three feet.

As each limb will act as a separate unit, the leaves on one limb will have no effect on the size of fruit on another limb. If your fruit crop is rather light and the remaining peaches are in clusters, these clusters can be left and the fruits will grow to marketable size. They may not get as large as if they were more uniformly spread over the trees, but it would be better to leave them thick and get peaches a little smaller than to remove them and get none.

Fruit Thinning Should Start Soon As Possible

With the June drop now pretty well completed, fruit thinning should get under way as soon as possible.

On apples as a general rule one apple can be left on every third spur. This will depend somewhat on the amount of new growth scattered through the tree. If the trees are heavily fruited, then it would be necessary to leave fewer apples. Beginners will almost always underthin and it is frequently necessary to thin trees a second and even a third time.

Most of our commercial apple growers sprayed their trees in full bloom in an effort to thin the blossoms at that time. This reduces the thinning bill and allows the remaining fruits to take on increased size. This is the

World War II Widows Eligible for Loans

Washington, June 5—(U.P.)—Widows of World War II servicemen who have not remarried are eligible for GI home, farm and business loans, the veterans administration ruled today.

The widows will be given the same benefits as veterans in the purchase of homes with VA-guaranteed mortgages, VA said. To be eligible, their husbands must have served in the armed forces some time between Sept. 16, 1940, and July 25, 1947, and must not have died from service-connected causes.

Redmond Plant Charged Unfair Labor Practices By Woodworkers' Union

Bend, Ore., June 5—(U.P.)—A hearing on charges of unfair labor practice filed against Dant and Russell, Ltd., by the CIO International Woodworkers started here Friday.

The company manufactures lumber products and has a plant at Redmond.

The union charged two members were discharged by the company for union activities after a strike. Ralph Winkler, Washington, D. C., is trial examiner.

Unemployment Costs Up in Pennsylvania

Pittsburgh (U.P.)—Pennsylvania's unemployment compensation administration is paying money out about twice as fast as it is coming in.

The big industrial state leads the nation in payments to jobless. Last year benefit payments in Pennsylvania totaled \$141,000,000. Receipts were \$76,000,000. However, the administration still had a balance of \$574,000,000 at the end of the year because of the huge surplus built up during the high-employment war years.

This year's payments are exceeding last year's. Strikes by the United Mine Workers have added considerably to the bill. While strikers are not eligible for benefits, workers made idle in coal-dependent industries are. These secondary idle drew \$48,897,222 during the first three months of this year.

Roseburg Night Club Destroyed by Blaze

Roseburg, Ore., June 5—(U.P.)—Fire Friday night destroyed the Club 99 which had been raided six weeks ago for gambling operations.

The club was located four miles north of Roseburg. Loss was estimated at \$15,000. Heat from the fire was so intense that automobiles could not pass on the highway and were lined up for two miles on either side for half an hour.

An application for an injunction to close the club still was pending in court. State police raided the club April 28 and arrested Operator Russell Duffy and Verna Ashbaugh for operating a gambling game and possession of a slot machine. They were released on payment of a fine.

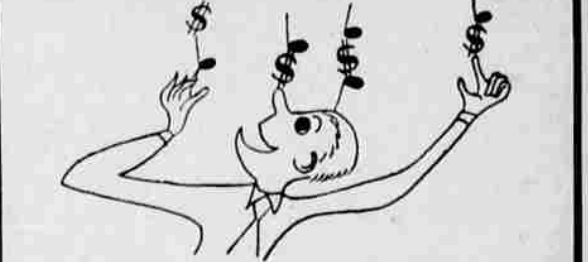
Eight Chicago People On Bus Suffer Injury

Chicago, June 5—(U.P.)—Eight persons suffered severe injuries today when a city bus collided with a taxicab, dashed out of control through a gasoline station and knocked a house from its foundation.

The bus driver and his five passengers were injured along with the cab driver and one occupant of the house. Two passengers in the cab and another occupant of the house escaped injury.

Lifetime Protection For Teeth Forecast

Pittsburgh (U.P.)—Complete dental protection for less than five cents a year is a definite possibility, according to Dr. F. A. Bull, director of the Wisconsin board of health.

Dr. Bull, speaking before the annual conference on dental health at Mellon Institute, said health authorities in Wisconsin are recommending that all communities "fluoridize" their water supplies to prevent tooth decay.

Bull said tests in different parts of the country showed that minute quantities of fluorine in the drinking water prevented practically all cavities in children's teeth. The immunity, he said, apparently was permanent.

He said that for a youngster who lives
