RHEUMATIZ AND PHYSICAL DEGENERATION

Reader writes: My husband was crippled with aching hands and knees and some times back. Could not hold a cup in the morning. I read your pamphlet Calcium and Rheumatiz. He began the ten weeks course of calcium and vitamin D as suggested in your pamphlet. In about four weeks he was so much better--all his aches and pains disappeared so gradually we could hardly realize... he is now as chipper as any forty years old man, although he is 72. You will never know the happiness your teachings have brought into our home. (Mrs. R. K.)

All I know is that the calcium and vitamin D can do no harm in any case. But who knows whether old C. O. Incidence accounts for the relief that occurred in this case?

Bear in mind, folks, I'm no specialist or authority, but it is my belief that most of the chronic rheumatiz people have today is the manifestation of physical degeneration, and as soon as I define physical degeneration again I'll tell you more. Webster says degeneration is "deterioration of a tissue or an organ in which its vitality is diminished; a substitution of a lower for a higher form of structure, either by chemical change of the tissue or the deposit of abnormal matter in the tissue." Stedman's medical dictionary says degeneration is "a retrogressive pathological change in cells or tissues in consequence of which the functional power is lost and the living substance becomes converted into an inert mass."

I hope these definitions convey some idea of the meaning of physical degeneration. It happens to everybody sooner or later--every one begins to degenerate, begins to die, the instant he or she reaches the peak of growth and development. Some begin to die at thirty or thirty-five, others not until forty or forty-five. It is the way of all life.

From what little I can learn about chronic arthritis or rheumatiz the condition is not inflammation at all (as the term arthritis--joint inflammation--implies) but a process of physical degeneration of bone, cartilage and other tissues of the joints. The physical degeneration is in no way due to cold, dampness, climate, weather, acid in the system or other extrinsic cause, in my opinion. I believe the chief cause of chronic rheumatiz is prolonged nutritional deficiency, especially insufficient daily intake of calcium, phosphorus and vitamin D. The chief cause, I say. In many cases it seems likely enough that other nutritional deficiencies through the years contribute to the trouble or hasten the process of degeneration, notably insufficient daily intake of the vitamins thiamine (B1) and riboflavin (B2) and the al-

Unemployed Lowest Since April, 1949

Washington, June 6--(U.P.)--The number of unemployed has dropped to the lowest mark since April, 1949, the census bureau reported today.

At the same time, the bureau said there were more people employed in May than at any time since last August.

There were 59,731,000 persons employed in May as compared to 58,668,000 in April. The number of unemployed was cut 438,000 to 3,067,000 in May. The unemployed in April totaled 3,515,000.

In contrast, there were 58,694,000 persons employed in May, 1949, while 3,289,000 were out of work.

The census bureau report showed the entire labor force in May to be 62,788,000, compared with 62,183,000 in April and with 61,963,000 in May 1949.

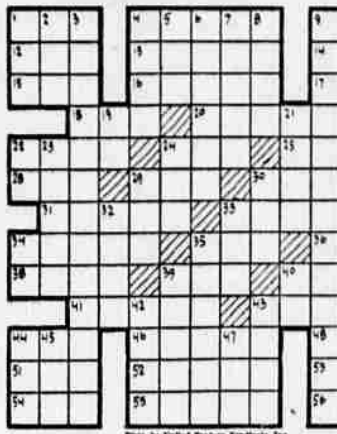

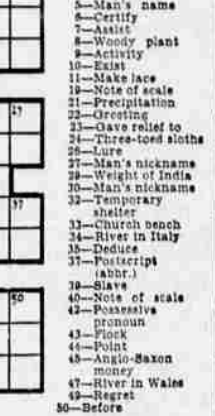

Second Oil Well Of Medford Firm Proves Success

J. Verne Shangle, Medford, who is interested in three oil drilling concerns largely owned by local investors, said today that a second well drilled by one of the three firms has struck oil, and is now in production. An oil strike on another well was reported last week.

Both wells are located in Illinois, and are operated by the Mutual Drilling company, of which Ed Anderson, Medford, is president. The new well will produce from 56 feet of oil bearing sand, Shangle said, and is located one-half mile north of the other well. Production men say the second well may prove out at 1,000 barrels a day, with the first producing at about 500.

Plan Kansas Well

Another company, the Big Six Drilling corporation of which Anderson is also president, plans to start drilling Wednesday on a well located on a lease in Kansas.

Mr. and Mrs. Anderson, accompanied by W. M. Lemmon, a director of the Mutual firm, plan to leave this week to view both properties, and Anderson says he will attempt to obtain a lease in the oil areas for the United Company of Oregon, a third firm largely financed by Medford and Klamath Falls men, which had conducted exploratory drilling in the Harney basin, near Burns.

Camp White, June 6--The first out-of-doors Sunday evening chapel services ever conducted here were held yesterday evening from the bandstand. The Apostolic Faith church, with the Rev. C. W.
