Wall Street

New York, June 6—(UP)—General Motors corporation common stock rose more than a quarter billion dollars in value today and lifted the stock market from the depths of a sharp sell-off.

The biggest automobile company in the world announced yesterday after the close that it was recommending a two-for-one split in its stock, first for one split in 1929 when it was split 2½ for 1. The first sale was 25,000 shares at 91, up 2½.

Dow Jones closing stock averages: 30 Industrials 223.46, up 1.70; 20 railroads 87.72, up 0.35; 15 utilities 43.28, up 0.03; 65 stocks 77.87, up 0.46.

Sales to day approximated 2,250,000 shares, compared with 1,630,000 shares traded yesterday.

FIRE CONTROLLED

Prescott, Ariz., June 6—(U.P.)—A forest fire which destroyed four square miles of pine and threatened the Groom Creek resort area was brought under control today.

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Animal Mutilator Gets Six-Month Jail Term

Albert E. Ryder, Jackson, who pleaded guilty in justice court Saturday to a charge of mutilating male dogs belonging to his neighbors, was sentenced to six months in the county jail Monday and was fined \$100 plus \$4.50 court costs.

The complaint against Ryder was filed by Mrs. Sydney G. Richardson of the state humane society. She appeared in court with evidence she had gathered at the scene of the crime and received permission of the court to deprive Ryder of the ownership of the dog he now has and any he may get in the future, she said.
