Medford Voters' League Supports County Zoning

Study and support of zoning in Jackson county was voted by membership of the League of Women Voters at a meeting held Saturday afternoon in the home of Mrs. R. W. Grey, Modoc avenue.

In explaining the urgent need for county-wide planning as a result of the rapid industrial growth of the county, Mrs. O. A. Eden pointed out that an enabling act was passed by the 1947 legislature but that zoning must be passed in turn by each county.

Mrs. Eva Ringo, Mrs. H. S. Hinman, Mrs. Lewis Wayburn and Mrs. Lester Adams were appointed to the board.

Mrs. S. E. Phillips, president, reported on the current agenda adopted by the national convention in Atlantic City in April. The convention voted "to work for United States policies directed toward world peace supported by a strong United Nations; an expanding domestic and world economy and a more responsive and efficient government."

The convention further voted to concentrate action on the "expansion of world trade and international economic development with maximum use of United Nations agencies; a continued analysis of the federal budget, and support of such fiscal measures as make for a stable and expanding domestic economy; reorganization measures to improve administrative efficiency in the development and use of natural resources."

In addition it was stressed to delegates, Mrs. Phillips reported, that voters' service is a year-round program for each league, this to include providing non-partisan, factual information on all phases of registration, on

candidates and issues; promotion of party participation and voting in all elections and building understanding of the essentials of party government.

Mrs. Phillips reported that the first quarter century of the league's history, recorded in nearly a ton of documents, now reposes in the manuscript division of the Library of Congress and said that this is the first time a non-governmental agency has been accepted for such recording. Dr. Solon J. Buck, director of the division, has stated he considers the league documents "social data of primary importance" and Lester H. Evans, librarian of congress, said "the scope of your concern for representative government, its depth and sincerity, have greatly impressed me; the thoughts of your members has steered and tempered public opinion and your action has furthered the public interest."

Mrs. Frank Fairweather gave a resume of the recent state convention in Klamath Falls. The convention voted to continue study of the Oregon legislature and Mrs. Lester Adams, local resource chairman on this item, explained that each of the nine local leagues was assigned one phase of legislative activity to study and that the state board would now compile these reports into a complete memo for the use of all leagues.

bureau, and bill drafting agency. Mrs. Ed Bolt of the study the league had made of youth authorities, and said the item, as adopted for the 1950-52 agenda reads "coordination, extension and improvement of social welfare services to youth on both state and local levels."

Mrs. Bolt stated that reports of the Child Welfare League of America, the government's committee on children and youth, and the Portland Council of Social Agencies would be studied to determine whether the youth authority or an alternate plan making use of existing agencies would be more effective. The lack of trained social welfare workers in Oregon was stressed as a prime factor in the slow spread of these services. Scholarships to schools outside the state have been given to encourage interest in this field.

Mrs. Stephen G. Nye reported that the state league would continue to work toward improvement of the basic tax structure of Oregon, placing special emphasis on sources of revenue, the six per cent limitation and the direct use of income tax revenues. Information on the children's bill, the soldiers' bonus bill and the welfare bill to be on the November ballot will be given by the league as a voters' service. The fourth item on the current state agenda of the league is the support of adequate state meat inspection legislation.

The business meeting in the evening followed a dinner held at Hunter Hunter's Hotel on the lakeshore near the site of Oregon's famed geyser and hot springs. Nuclear Physicist Given Barnard Medal

New York, June 7—(U.P.)—Columbia university announced today that Enrico Fermi, nuclear physicist, had been awarded the 1950 Barnard gold medal for "meritorious service to science." The award is made on the recommendation of the National Academy of Sciences.

The university said Dr. Fermi, professor of physics at the University of Chicago, received the award for: "His contributions to the increased understanding of nature, in the fields of theoretical and experimental research; his central role in the discovery and interpretation of the principles of quantum mechanics and their applications to atomic nuclear phenomena, and for his important role in the investigations of the properties of the atomic nucleus and the behavior in their interaction with nuclei."
