Tension, Rumors Fill Formosa as Island Awaits Battle Sure to Come

United Press Correspondent Taipei, Formosa, June 7.—(U.P.) Formosa today is another Hawaii awaiting the historic battle of Midway.

There's the same tension and expectancy, the same rumors that filled Honolulu eight years ago when the Japanese launched their long-anticipated invasion of Midway island.

Embattled Island

Formosa is an embattled island. Its doom has been forecast repeatedly by Peiping's honey-tongued communist newscasters, who use the prophecies Tokyo Rose made so familiar to Hawaii radio listeners. Its threat comes from the air and sea, just as Hawaii's did.

The towns are filled with uniforms, the palm-shaded beaches are snarled with barbed wire. The same American tanks and trucks rumble along the highways, painted the same dirty wartime colors that smeared everything in Hawaii. Even the planes patrolling the skies are the same vintage as those which defended Hawaii. But now they are much older, dirtier and more decrepit.

Northwest's First Planetarium Opens

Portland, June 7.—Oregon Museum of Science and Industry here began showings yesterday at a new planetarium dedicated Sunday.

The planetarium is reportedly the first in the northwest. Its schedule calls for a showing and lecture at noon, 4 p.m. and 8 p.m. daily except Monday.

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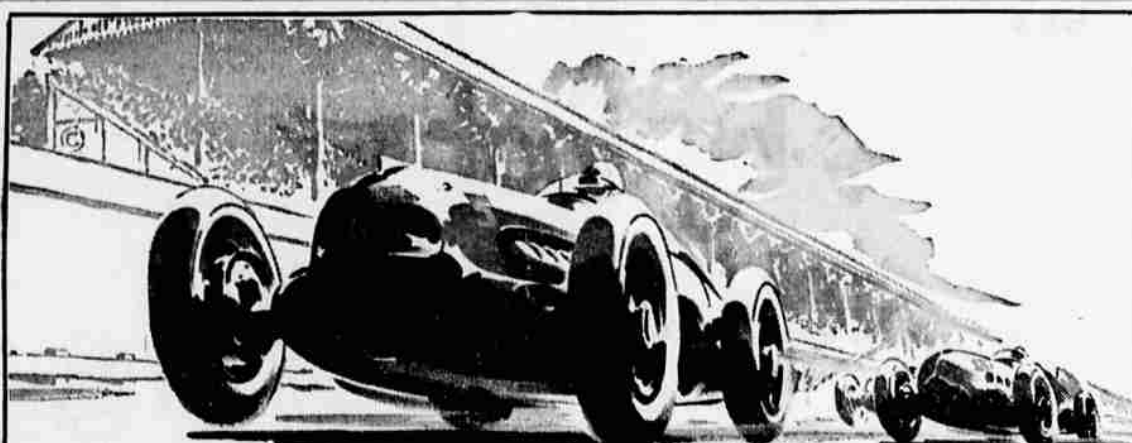
