Letter From Washington

The sudden passing of one of the members of the house of representatives was quite a shock to the membership. Both William Lemke of North Dakota and John Lesinski of Michigan were well known and well liked. I was not well acquainted with Congressman Lesinski but Bill Lemke was a good friend. The last time I saw him was at my daughter's wedding just a few days before he died. Everybody called Mr. Lemke "Bill" and everybody liked him. On the other hand, Bill had many ideas about government that very few of us, at least on our side of the aisle, could agree with. In this work, however, friendships are not based upon attitudes regarding legislation. Here it is quite common for close personal friends to be professional and political enemies.

With the death of John Lesinski, who was chairman of the house committee on education and labor, Graham Barden of North Carolina becomes chairman. It is an automatic succession based upon the seniority rule. It is doubtful if any two persons ever more completely disagreed on legislation than did Lesinski and Barden. Since the chairman of a committee has considerable power in the operations of the group, it is certain that the nature of the legislative production of the education and labor committee will be materially changed. For one thing, Lesinski favored the repeal of the Taft-Hartley law. Barden is equally dead set against its repeal.

IT SEEMS to me the overall political scene in our country today is more mixed up than it has ever been in all our history. For example, Raymond Moley, now an editor and an author, was just about number one "brain trust" of the new deal. Now he declares that socialists have taken over the democratic party. Not long ago Moley said: "Shrouded under names like liberal and progressives, the socialists crept into the democratic party and have taken it over. Truman has become the spokesman for their purposes."

SPEAKING OF quotations, here is one by Charles F. Keating, famous inventor and scientist which I think is something of a cutie. Keating says: "One of those things we have to be thankful for is that we don't get as much government as we pay for."

IN THE SPRING of 1948 when our country was still suffering from shortages of several basic commodities, steel among them, the interstate and foreign commerce committee, of which I am a member, held weeks of hearings on the fuel oil shortage problem. We learned that one of the difficulties in oil production was the shortage of steel. We also learned from department of commerce officials that the department's office of international trade was still issuing export licenses for the export of steel products and only ceased issuing such licenses when our committee began putting the heat on them.

We were told that Russia, who had not been a big steel customer before the war, was shipped 600 times as much steel in 1948 and 360 times as much steel in 1947 as she had ordinarily received from us before the war. Those two years were the years of our most desperate shortage of steel. We also learned that one of the men who was recently discharged by Secretary Sawyer was in an important executive position in the department office which handled the export licenses for shipments to Russia. I had forgotten this testimony until the discharges were announced. Then I took a few hours and read it. There was something peculiar, if not wrong, or to bad judgment, or it could have been due to unusual friendliness toward Russia. I haven't information enough to state definitely what was wrong. I feel pretty certain however that firing a few department officials will do the country no harm.

PLENTY OF WORK
Stillwater, Okla. (U.P.)—Chief Justice Denver Davidson of the Oklahoma supreme court advised young lawyers they will find plenty of work in Oklahoma. In a speech to Oklahoma A. & M. college law students, Davidson said Oklahoma is the most litigating state in the nation. He pointed out that the high court has had to decide 41,000 cases since Oklahoma became a state.

PREVENTION AND RELIEF OF LIVER TROUBLE

What I said about the asininity of approaching the doctor with your own ready-made diagnosis of "high blood pressure," "bad nerves," "acidosis," "auto-intoxication," "lazy liver," "mucous colitis" or just plain common sense. But I concede that it is merely telling you what NOT to do about liver trouble.

If you think that's what ails you. Ah, ah! Read the preceding article on this subject again, stupid, and you'll find I did tell you what to DO about it. What? You don't see it in the paper? Well, then, we must conclude that you ARE stupid, or else the paper omitted the part saying: "When you consult a physician leave your own funny notions as to the cause and nature of your trouble out of it."

In other words, tell the doctor what you complain of, not what you think a doctor would diagnose.

I offer today some suggestions which can do no harm in any case and may do good in many cases of real or imaginary liver trouble, including chronic gall-bladder trouble. The measures I suggest are primarily preventive but a great many reports from readers indicate that these measures may bring considerable relief in chronic cases.

First is massage of liver and gall-sac twice a day, automatic-massage, that is. There isn't room here to give the necessary practical instructions for this, if you care to try it, out send 25 cents and stamped self-addressed envelope for booklet How to Breathe and begin regular practice of the breathing exercise described on pages 9, 10, 11 and 12.

Second is a dozen rolls every day, half a dozen first thing in the morning on rising, another half dozen last thing at night before retiring. I call 'em somersaults. What Webster calls 'em I don't know, but my kind of somersaults are NOT what Webster calls somersaults, so if you try a flying leap in the air sue Webster for any damage you suffer. One rolling my kind of somersault never loses contact with ground or floor. Rolling a dozen somersaults daily is particularly beneficial for persons with or without chronic liver and/or gall-bladder trouble who are subject to "poor circulation," sallow complexion and cold feet. Not that these are in any way symptomatic of liver or gall-bladder trouble. A commodity you will always find me fresh out of is symptoms. I have no lists or catalogues of them for you to try on, and I leave to lesser quacks the long-distance interpretation of any symptoms you may have in mind.

Third is increased efficiency of digestion, to be obtained through good dentistry—that is, the proper treatment of decayed or infected teeth by your dentist and immediate dentures to replace missing teeth, so that you keep all 28 to 32 teeth—your own or the artificial ones made and installed by your dentist—functioning. Only by good mastication of food can any one have or maintain good digestion. This is no mere fancy or theory. It is a plain statement of fact based on elementary physiology and many years of study and observation. With good, functioning teeth or dentures one with liver or gall-bladder trouble has a fair chance to prevent serious complications or even to get complete relief. With neglected teeth there is little chance.
