

Events Listed For 9th Annual Rodeo

Youngsters will have their day during the Jackson County Mounted Sheriff's posse's ninth annual Rogue River Roundup. In addition to parade entries, boys and girls will vie for honors in the Saturday afternoon free show for kids at the rodeo grounds.

An addition to the professional rodeo, the free kids' show with attendance open to anyone, was started in 1948 by Capt. Stan Morgan, Dr. Charles Lomery and Dr. Stan Phillips of the posse. This show provides prizes and fun for boys and girls under 12 years of age. Also added is a calf cutting out contest for 4-H club members only, age 14 to 16 inclusive—the winner keeping the calf.

Top Riders Coming
Top cowpokes from all over the country will compete at the Saturday night and Sunday rodeo, riding and roping Christensen Brothers' line of stock.

Following a 6:30 p.m. downtown parade Saturday, the night show will get underway at 8 p.m. with the grand entry and introduction of officials. First section of the rodeo will be the barrel race, followed by the calf roping, cutting horse, and bronc riding.

Columbia Basin Forecasters Say Rivers Rising

Portland, Ore., June 7.—(U.P.)—Forecasters for the Columbia basin indicated today rivers were rising despite cooler temperatures during the past 24 hours.

Forecasters indicated there was no immediate flood danger but low-level docks on the Willamette river at Portland were under water. The river was up 4 feet to a point 1.1 feet above its 13 flood stage yesterday.

Columbia Up
At Vancouver, Wash., the Columbia was also up 4 feet to 19.2 feet, 4.2 feet above its flood stage.

Pacific power and light officials said there was a little more seepage than normal in the area around the Lincoln power station on the north side of the Willamette, but indicated the situation was not unusual.

Underpass Closed
High water at Vancouver forced authorities to close the interstate bridge underpass.

The weather bureau said rises in the basin rivers were the result of warmer temperatures during the past week. Slow rises were expected to continue during the next few days, with a slight tapering off at the week's end.

McKay Describes Need for Solution To Unemployment

Lakeview, Ore., June 7.—(U.P.)—Gov. Douglas McKay told the Lakeview Chamber of Commerce last night of an urgent need to find an answer to Oregon's seasonal employment problem.

The governor in Lakeview with other high state officials will meet today with sportsmen and others interested in an effort to reach accord in a controversy involving some of the nation's best waterfowl nesting grounds in Warner Valley of Lake county.

No. 1 Problem
In his speech, Oregon's chief executive pointed out unemployment as Oregon's No. 1 problem.

"With three main sources of income—logging, agriculture and tourism—with some stable enterprises," the governor said, "these main sources of income are all seasonal."

As an example, McKay pointed to the huge quantities of rough lumber shipped out of the state. He sees the finishing of lumber products in the state as one step toward correcting the unemployment situation.

The big issue of the officials' trip will be taken up today.

Sportsmen Divided
Sportsmen, who are divided on the matter of developing a part of Warner Valley for farming, are expected to be widely represented at the conference in the valley today.

The state land board has contracted to build a dike at Crump lake in the valley for irrigation purposes, and it has under consideration the leasing of 8,000 acres for cultivation—mostly grains.

Some sportsmen have expressed belief that such development would help rather than hinder the game preserve.

Other sportsmen have said they fear the development would endanger the nesting grounds. State Engineer Charles E. Stricklin will be at today's meeting to give his views.

Many GI's Converting Insurance Policies

More and more World War II veterans are converting the term life insurance they took out during the war to the permanent types of policies available under national service life insurance laws, the veterans administration said today.

In the Pacific northwest states of Washington, Oregon, Idaho and Montana, and the territory of Alaska, 57,000 veterans have converted their NSLI policies to permanent plans, the VA said.

Term insurance may be converted to one or more of the six permanent plans without a physical examination at any time. Unless converted or renewed, it expires at the end of the term period. The premium rate for permanent policies is based on age at the time of conversion and remains the same for the life of the contract.

\$1,000 Damage Asked In Death of Hound

L. L. Lewis, professional game hunter from Central Point, yesterday filed a damage suit in circuit court here against Robert F. Nichols for \$1,000, said to be the value of a dog that Nichols is alleged to have run over and killed.

In his complaint, filed by Attorney Hugh Collins, Lewis claims that Nichols was negligent and careless in the operation of a motor bus May 10, 1950, and ran over the hound as it lay in the road in front of the Lewis home.

The county school superintendent's office this week is preparing 443 diplomas for Jackson county eighth graders. The total number of students passing from the eighth into the ninth grades in the county is 853, but the 125 eighth graders in Ashland and the 285 in Medford do not receive diplomas under the junior high school system.
