Fourth Survivor Of B-29 Plunge Into Sea Found

Yarmouth, England, June 8—(U.P.)—The third and fourth survivors and two more bodies from a United States air force B-29 Superfortress which crashed in flames in the North sea last night were found today.

This brought the known dead to three and the known survivors from the 11-man crew to four. Hope faded for survival of the other four officers and men who were aboard the four-engine plane when it plunged down 36 miles off this east coast port.

Twenty American and British planes and helicopters, royal naval vessels and a score of small craft still searched the North sea for trace of the wrecked plane and the missing men.

They found the two bodies today miles from the spot where the plane went down with one of its four engines afloat.

Sgt. Charles F. Allen of Derry, N. H., was fished out of the chilly sea today after he had floated for hours in a Mae West life jacket with a red light aglow on his shoulder.

The other survivor rescued today was not identified at once.

Medford High to Graduate Seniors At 9 P. M. Today

Principal Lester Harris reported this morning that everything is in readiness for the 37th annual commencement at Medford high school, set for 9 p. m. today in the high school stadium.

Apprehension about the weather was dispelled by the day's blue skies and rising temperatures, and it is thought the school's first outdoor commencement will be successful in all details.

Dr. C. Herbert Smith, president of Willamette university, will give the address of the evening. He arrived in the city this morning and this noon will be a guest of members of Beta Theta Pi fraternity at a luncheon at the Rogue Valley Country club.

Dr. Smith is national president of the group.

Harris announced that those attending tonight's ceremonies are to use the east entrances to the stadium. The chutes under the new grandstand will be open for spectators, he said, and remaining gates will be locked until the entrance of the class, largest in the history of the school—231.

The general public is invited to attend. One section is being reserved for parents and other relatives of the graduates, and remaining sections will be open to anyone interested in attending.

The principal asked that persons bringing gifts and flowers leave them in Room 2 of the high school building, instead of taking them to the stadium.

Donaldson Ordered To Restore Service

Washington, June 8—(U.P.)—The house postoffice committee today approved a bill to order Postmaster General Jesse M. Donaldson to restore full mail service. The vote was 12 to 8.

Donaldson last month ordered service cutbacks on the advice of the house appropriations committee in an effort to cut down his department's \$550 million annual deficit.

The cutbacks included residential deliveries from two to one a day, a cut of some business deliveries from three to two a day and earlier closing of some postoffice windows.

The restoration bill was sponsored by 35 house members.

Tokyo, Japan, June 8—(U.P.)—Primary school children of 10 schools in Tokyo began a drive today to send 3,000 cherry trees to border New York's East River drive near the new United Nations headquarters.

WITNESSES CALLED IN AMERASIA CASE

Remington Indicted For Perjury by Federal Grand Jury

Former Commerce Employee Charged

New York, June 8—(U.P.)—Suspended commerce department Employee William Remington was indicted for perjury today by a federal grand jury. It charged he gave untruthful information in its investigation of subversive activities.

A one-count indictment charged that Remington did "unlawfully, knowingly and willingly" lie when he gave a negative answer to the grand jury's question: "At any time have you ever been a member of the communist party?"

"I never have been," the indictment said he replied. This alleged untruth was spoken "on or about May 25, 1950," the indictment said.

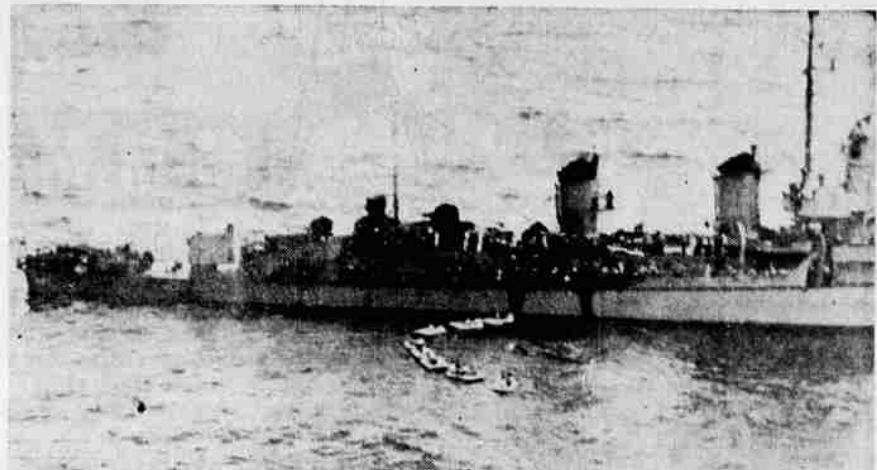
It said that his reply "as he then and there well knew," was untrue "in that the defendant had been a member of the communist party."

Remington first was called a communist party member in congressional testimony by ex-Soviet Spy Elizabeth Bentley in 1948. The department of commerce's security board later gave him a clean bill of health and he sued Miss Bentley when she again called him a communist, but without congressional immunity. He received an out-of-court settlement of the libel suit.

Forced To Resign

A second charge in congress a few weeks ago that he was a communist brought an ultimatum from Secretary of Commerce Charles Sawyer that he resign his \$10,000-a-year job as department economist or be fired. He refused and was suspended pending departmental trial.

If convicted Remington would face a maximum penalty of five years in prison and a fine of \$10,000.

Senate May Kill Rent Control

Washington, June 8—(U.P.)—Senate Democratic Leader Scott W. Lucas conceded today that the senate may let rent controls die at the end of this month.

The Illinois democrat said defections among democratic senators may prevent passage of a pending bill to extend the rent law in limited form for another year. The measure, almost identical to one before the house, would end federal controls December 31 unless local authorities take positive action to extend them for another six months.

Democrats Opposed

"I don't know whether I have the votes," he told reporters. A lot of democrats are opposed to the bill.

Lucas said he did not know whether enough republicans would support the legislation to offset democratic defections.

He said he hoped to get a vote some time this week, despite a filibuster staged against the measure by Sen. Harry P. Cain (R., Wash.). Lucas said there might be a night session of the senate tomorrow.

Cain spoke for three hours and 13 minutes at the start of his filibuster yesterday and promised to talk "as long as my health and good humor hold out."

Consent to Continue

He sat down only when he obtained unanimous consent to pick up where he left off when the senate gets some routine business out of the way. That might be tonight, or perhaps tomorrow.

The present rent law expires June 30. Almost identical house and senate bills would end controls on December 31 unless local communities take definite action to extend them for another six months.

Despite Cain's filibuster, Chairman Burnet R. Maybank, D. S.C.) of the senate banking committee, which drafted the measure said he thought the senate would take action Monday. He predicted passage of some kind of extension bill.

House to Wait

Cain originally planned to try to prevent a senate vote until the house acted on its bill. But Lucas announced yesterday that house leaders, who once intended to take up the issue Monday, now intend to wait for senate action.

The Washington republican then announced that he would keep up his filibuster "as long as I can stand up." He is confident that, with some help from other republicans, he can delay action until next week at least.

President to Meet With War Buddies

Washington, June 8—(U.P.)—President Truman flies to Missouri today for his annual bivouac with his buddies of World War I, the veterans of the 35th division, who call him "Captain Harry" instead of "Mr. President."

The chief executive and members of his staff were scheduled to take off at 5 p. m. (EDT) for St. Louis, where he planned a quiet evening with close friends.

Early tomorrow, Mr. Truman will board a train for Columbia, Mo., where he will receive an honorary degree from the University of Missouri, plus honorary membership in Phi Beta Kappa, the scholastic fraternity, and will deliver a major speech on foreign policy.

The president then will return to St. Louis by train. A brief rear platform stop is scheduled at Mexico, Mo., where a number of his friends have planned a track-side greeting.

Armed Services Group Okays Draft Extension

Washington, June 8—(U.P.)—The senate armed services committee today unanimously approved a three-year extension of the draft law with no strings attached.

The present law expires June 24.

The house had voted a two-year extension, but required that both houses of congress must pass a joint resolution before any man actually could be inducted.

The senate group voted to allow the president to induct men, if he sees fit, without consulting congress.

President Truman had requested a three-year simple extension, which the senate committee approved.

Czechs Must Pay Penalty of Death

Prague, June 8—(U.P.)—Four of 13 Czechs accused of plotting with American and other foreign diplomats to overthrow Czechoslovakia's communist government were sentenced to death tonight.

The state court sentenced four other defendants to life imprisonment and the remaining five to prison terms of 15 to 25 years.

All 13 had pleaded guilty to treason and espionage charges.

Prosecutor Capt. Jura Vieska said in his final summation that the trial had proved western diplomats interfered in Czechoslovakia's domestic affairs. American diplomats played the leading role, he said.

Grain Shipments to Japan Will Decline

Portland, Ore., June 8—(U.P.)—Government grain shipments to Japan from Portland will be much less this month.

Only 43,000 long tons are designated for loading in the Columbia river and Puget Sound, compared with an average of more than 100,000 tons a month during the last two years.

Glasgow, Scotland, June 8—Fire broke out in the Birming-Glasgow express near Glasgow tonight. First reports said at least five persons were burned to death.

SEVERAL CALLED BY FEDERAL GRAND JURY

Washington, June 8—(U.P.)—A reliable congressional source said today that a secret federal grand jury in New York City has reopened the 1945 Amerasia stolen documents case and has been calling witnesses for several weeks.

Among those called as witnesses, the source said, are James M. McInerney, head of the justice department's criminal division, and FBI agents who participated in the controversial case. The case involved the theft of hundreds of secret government diplomatic and military papers.

The grand jury, it was said, plans to summon Brig. Gen. Julius Holmes, former assistant secretary of state and now United States minister to Britain, and James K. Vardaman Jr., formerly President Truman's naval aide and now a member of the federal reserve board.

Holmes told the senate foreign relations subcommittee yesterday that to the best of his recollection it was Vardaman who on May 31, 1945, ordered prosecutions held up in the case. The order was countermanded by President Truman on June 2. On June 6 the FBI arrested six persons, including two state department officials.

Vardaman has denied he gave the go-slow order.

Forrestal Named

The committee has been informed that a note found in justice department files indicates that the late Secretary of Navy James Forrestal was the one who actually intervened, apparently seeking to avoid "friction" with Russia over the question of Pacific mandated islands seized from Japan during the war.

Of the six persons arrested, three were indicted. Two of the six—Philip Jaffe, editor of the magazine "Amerasia," and Emanuel S. Larsen, former state department officer—paid fines.

Whitewash Charged

Besides McInerney, those said to have testified already before the New York grand jury include Myron Gurnea, an FBI agent, and ex-Agent D. M. Ladd, both of whom participated in cracking the original case.

Ever since the case was ended with the payment of two fines, some republicans have charged an administration "whitewash" and that the prosecution "bungled" the job. But justice department officials, however, have maintained that illegal entry without warrants, "tainted" the available evidence and that the government was lucky to obtain one conviction and payment of two fines.

Oregon May Turn To Property Levy As Revenue Source

Newport, Ore., June 8—(U.P.)—The state of Oregon may face an early turn to a levy against property to compensate for decreased income tax revenues, State Senator Howard C. Belton of Clackamas county told a legislative interim committee hearing here.

The committee met with Lincoln county taxpayers to "hear their views" on taxation. He said the committee was not trying to promote new taxes.

Income Revenues Down

Belton said income tax revenues were down more than \$10 million from the 1949 level and that the state was spending about \$12 million a year more than it was taking in.

Of the \$10 million slump, \$7 million was accounted for by a drop in personal income taxes and more than \$3 million by a decrease in excise tax collections, Belton said.

He told the hearing that taxpayers themselves were responsible for high taxes because much of the tax now levied on property in Oregon was accounted for by special levies voted by the people.

"Either you went out and voted for these special levies or you stayed home and didn't vote against them, which amounts to the same thing," Belton said.

Earl B. Day, Medford, former legislator and former member of the state tax commission, advocated appointment of county assessors by the county courts in cooperation with the state tax commission. Day said such a reform would take the office of assessor out of politics.

Manslaughter Charge Faces Police Officer

Albany, Ore., June 8—(U.P.)—District Attorney Melvin Goode today filed a manslaughter charge against Sweet Home Police Officer Albert Osborn in connection with the fatal shooting of Theodore James Sylvester at Lebanon, Ore., Tuesday morning.

Filing of the charge climaxed an investigation of the shooting which resulted from a wild race between Sylvester and officers Osborn and Kakarel Hyer of Sweet Home.

After officers overtook Sylvester, police reported that a gun was discharged during a scuffle in the Sweet Home squad car, as Sylvester was being placed under arrest on a traffic violation charge.

Authorities said Sylvester tried to struggle with the officers even to his dying moments as he lay on the operating table at the Lebanon general hospital.

Elks Convention To Open Tomorrow

Corvallis, Ore., June 8—(U.P.)—Elks lodge delegates began arriving here today for the 1950 state convention tomorrow, Saturday and Sunday.

Hundreds of Elks and their wives were expected to flood the city by tomorrow.

Norman Johnson, Corvallis exalted ruler, urged early registration of Elks coming from the immediate vicinity. Most of the delegates were expected to arrive for opening business sessions tomorrow.

A banquet tonight will start festivities.

Highlights of the convention include an outdoor barbecue Saturday, a grand ball Saturday night and a three-mile-long parade tomorrow.

With local hotels and auto courts filled, many Elks will be housed in Corvallis and Albany homes and Oregon State college fraternity houses which have been opened by the Student Inter-Fraternity council.

Decorated Hero Giving Medals Away

Hollywood, June 8—(U.P.)—Actor Audie Murphy, this country's most decorated hero of World War II, has given away his 24 medals to kids all over the country, he revealed today.

His congressional medal of honor went to his 8-year-old nephew, Weldon Burns of Farmersville, Tex., and a few of his other trophies were given to a son of Ray Wood, Dallas auto dealer.

Murphy's last medal, the distinguished service cross, will go to Claudine Tipton of Erwin, Tenn., as a high school graduation present. Miss Tipton is the daughter of Murphy's war buddy, Lottie Tipton, who was killed during the war.

"I just wanted these folks to have my medals," Murphy said.
