

28 Years as 'Perfect' Postmaster Ends as Man Faces Prison Sentence

Tacoma, Wash., June 8—(U.P.)—Twenty-eight years with a "perfect record" as the Centralia, Wash., assistant postmaster ended here today when Herschell E. Waitt was sentenced to 15 months in the federal penitentiary.

Waitt, 49, pleaded guilty to six counts including embezzlement, forging a contract and bid, and making false entries of post office employees' earnings. No Excuse

"We have nothing in excuse for his actions," said Waitt's attorney. "I don't know how better to describe it than 'pure stupidity.'"

Said Waitt: "I'm sorry I did it. I'd like to ask the court for consideration."

U. S. District Judge Charles H. Leavy said the aggregate penalty could run to 50 years, but pronounced the 15-month sentence in view of the fact that Waitt had made restitution.

"But," the judge said, "though you have reimbursed the government you cannot wipe out those crimes."

He also pleaded guilty to forging a contract and bid with his wife's name for the use of a car

during the Christmas mail rush. He admitted the car was not used for that purpose.

Waitt would have retired from the post office department in six years.

Youngster Surprises Would-Be Burglar

Portland, Ore., June 8—(U.P.)—A fourteen-year-old Portlander, Leo Rogalie, Jr., surprised a would-be burglar and caused him to leap from a ladder and flee, police reported today.

The boy told his father, Leo H. Rogalie (911 S.E. 15th avenue), he heard a noise outside, armed himself with a knife, and slipped around the side of the house. There he saw the prowler halfway up a ladder toward a bedroom window.

The second story man saw the youth's shadow, leaped from the ladder and ran.

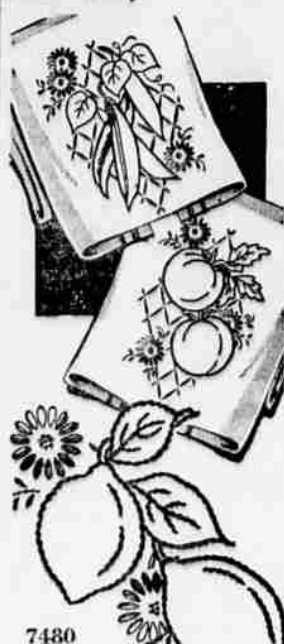

Airport Traffic Up In May Over April

Traffic at Medford municipal airport during May was somewhat increased over the previous month, according to the monthly report of the city superintendent's office.

Landings last month numbered 4,186 compared to 4,051 for April. May landings were 256 air force, 130 navy, 3,032 civil (mostly local) and 748 air carrier. Airline passengers arriving and departing last month totaled 8,977. Mail handled was 3,482 pounds, express 2,691 and freight 20,424.

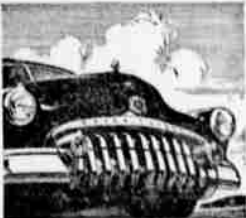
