INCREASING CHILD HEALTH AND INTELLIGENCE

Another thing that drives me to the bowling green many a time when I might otherwise remain here in my lonely cubicle pounding away at this thankless task, trying to teach you heedless people elementary physiology and hygiene, is the notion that a dose or more particularly a "shot" of this or that vitamin, or a shot-gun mixture of vitamins, gives one "pep." This notion, too, is fostered, I find, by the charlatans who cater to the popular demand for "shots." You get just as much "pep" from that as you get from a plate of pork and cabbage or a hot dog when you are hungry.

If Dr. Harrell's experiment on the New York school children and the results she obtained from animal experiments with the entire vitamin B complex are heeded by physicians, nutrition and health authorities and educators it may increase the level of health and intelligence of future citizens. Parents at least should know that we now have good and sufficient evidence that an adequate daily intake of at least one of the components of the B complex, thiamine, is not only essential for good general health and vigor, but, if child or youth has had the usual refined American diet with its excessive proportions of high caloric carbohydrate items made chiefly from refined white flour and refined sugar or syrup, a daily ration of B complex, or just B1 (thiamine) to supplement the diet will generally improve functional health and mental alertness as well.

This is nutrition, not medicine. Such a daily ration of vitamins or minerals or both is not to be confused with medicine. It is simply the nutritional element or elements the daily diet should provide but, thanks to modern refinements, processes and habits, does not provide in the quantities required by growing children or adult.

If the modern diet of child and adult were not so highly processed and refined, natural food would provide a de qu a to amounts of these essentials of good nutrition. Such a natural diet would be "protective"—that is, it would protect the individual against what we have lately learned to recognize as nutritional deficiency disease. And let me tell you 99 out of each thousand American child and youths and adults could do with more protection.

Take a hundred children, fifteen or twenty years old, divide them into two groups, feed one group only white bread or things made of white flour, and refined sugar or syrup or things containing it, and feed the other group only whole wheat bread or things made of whole wheat flour, and crude brown sugar or old fashioned (open kettle) molasses or things containing it—besides the usual milk, vegetables, meat, fruit, etc.—for a season, say three months.
