

Marshall Warns on Wishful Thinking; Possibility of Soviet Collapse Seen

Washington, June 8—(U.P.)—Gen. George C. Marshall warned today against wishful thinking, but he said there is "always a

possibility" that Russia's government may topple. Marshall, former secretary of state, said the Russians are having some hard problems even though not much about it is heard here. These problems will get tougher in time, he said.

Society Unstable
The soldier-statesman told the house foreign affairs committee that a society built around a police state like Russia's is very unstable.

"When it starts to topple it comes down with a crash," Marshall said. "I see no probability of its toppling now. But there is always a possibility of its toppling."

Marshall appeared before the committee to urge approval of a \$1,222,500,000 new installment of free arms for the western democracies.

Failure Fatal
He said any failure to build up Europe's defenses against Soviet aggression would be "fatal" and would play straight into Russia's hands. He said the United States must keep going strong and must continue its effort to build up free Europe—both economically and militarily.

He said the Russians are not likely to go to war over an incident. Russian leaders are coldly calculating men who will go to war only when they think they can win, he said.

As for unrest, Marshall said he has no knowledge of his own that there is any significant underground movement in Russia. He said some statements he has seen on this question sound to him like wishful thinking.

Over Two-Thirds of Oregon Jobless Now Back at Work

Salem, Ore., June 8—(U.P.)—More than two-thirds of Oregon's unemployed are now back on the job, the state unemployment compensation commission reported today.

Unemployment in the state last week dropped to 30,434, lowest June 1 figure since end of the war, the commission said.

A year ago, the commission said, 39,600 persons were unemployed in Oregon. During winter seasonal shutdowns the past two years the unemployment figure rose above the 90,000 mark with 97,000 out of work in mid-February of this year.

Additional Jobs
Lumber and logging, construction, food processing and agriculture industries provided 10,500 additional jobs last month and 55,000 jobs during the previous three months in the spring recovery.

Harvest and canning operations were expected to add further to the employed lists, the commission reported.

About 85,000 are employed in the lumber and logging industries, the commission estimated, compared with the post-war low of 55,000 last winter and a high of 91,000 in August, 1948.

Grants Pass Dentist To Head Society

Dr. Robert L. Platner, Grants Pass, was elected president of the Southern Oregon Dental society at a meeting held at the Rogue Valley Country club Tuesday night. He succeeds Dr. D. Bruce Stanley, Medford.

Other officers elected include Dr. Thomas P. Monahan, secretary; Dr. R. E. Walker, Grants Pass, counselor, and Dr. Glenn Phetteplace, Medford, correspondent. Members of the group are from Jackson and Josephine counties.

The group will register with the University of Illinois telephone extension program, it was decided. Under the plan nationally prominent educators from 11 universities deliver lectures for direct telephone transmission. They will cover current advances in dentistry.

Dr. B. L. Lageson, Medford, will be in charge of study groups, and will request each member of the society to present either a clinic or scientific paper during the coming year.

Portland Youngster Drowns in Willamette

Portland, Ore., June 8—(U.P.)—A 10-year-old boy, Arthur Sellick, drowned in the Willamette river Tuesday night after he fell off a pontoon while fishing.

Harbor police recovered the body less than a half hour later. Portland police said the Sellick boy and a companion missed their footing and toppled into the water while jumping from one pontoon to another at the Swan island sea plane base.

The other youth—unidentified—managed to catch a piling and was pulled to safety by other companions. A rope was tossed to Sellick, but he went under before he could grasp it.

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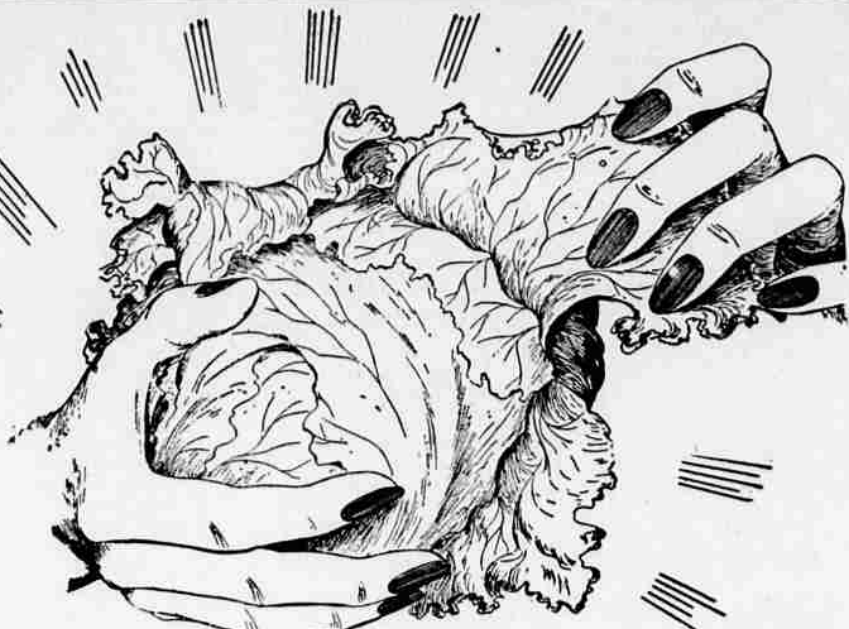
