Forest Roads in Good Condition, Service Reports

A report on forest road conditions from the Rogue River national forest service revealed today that most of the principal routes to the main recreation areas in southern Oregon are open for travel.

The road between Fish Lake and Lake o' Woods, and the road from Dead Indian soda springs to Big Elk are both open and in good condition, the forest service said. All roads in the Lake o' Woods vicinity are open and in good condition with exception of the east side summer home road which is being repaired by forest service crews.

The Dead Indian road is in good shape as far as the county line, but the portion that lies within Klamath county is reported to be rough. Klamath county graders are at work on it. The road from Dead Indian to Fish Lake by way of Big Elk is now open but the forest service said it is rough and muddy.

Two Roads Blocked

The Four Mile lake road and the Siskiyou summit road are both blocked by snow. Loyd Bransford, forest engineer, cautioned those traveling in forest areas that windstorms at the higher elevations are still blowing over snags and trees, and motorists should be alert for logs down on the road.

When the headquarters staff of Crater Lake national park moves its offices to the park today and Friday, they will find wintry conditions still prevailing there. Two inches of snow fell in the park Tuesday night and the minimum temperature there this morning was 25 degrees. Roads from the south and west are open but are in a slushy condition, the park service said.

Ice Follies Skater Shows Improvement

Bend, Ore., June 8.—U.P.—Ice Follies star Nancy McKenzie's condition was reported as improved at the St. Joseph hospital here today, but doctors feared the car crash that killed two other stars might cost the young woman her ice skating career.

Jeanne Crystall and Charles Davidson were killed when Davidson apparently fell asleep at the wheel and crashed into some lava rock north of here Monday morning while the trio was driving from Portland to San Francisco.

Miss McKenzie will be hospitalized for months in traction splints and her leg fractures were regarded by doctors as serious enough to cost her an ice skating career. Her other injuries include a broken arm and a dislocated hip.

Funeral services for Davidson will be held Saturday in his home town of Brantford, Ont., while Miss Crystall will be buried in Brooklyn, N. Y., the same day.

Multnomah Citizens Set Special Election

Portland, Ore., June 8.—U.P.—Multnomah county citizens will vote July 14 in a special election on a 4½-mill, five-year special tax levy for county government, while the formation of a citizens group to support the levy appeared likely today.

The county commissioners set the Friday date yesterday when they filed a special election certificate with Registrar of Elections James Gleason.

Gleason said he would start work immediately on setting up polling stations. Meanwhile, Mason L. Bingham, chairman of the county tax commission, said the first steps were being taken to organize a group to inform voters of the need for the extra tax.

Klamath Youngster Shot by Playmate

Klamath Falls, Ore., June 8.—U.P.—Fourteen-year-old Robert Claton, severely wounded yesterday when a playmate shot him with a shotgun during an argument, was recovering today at the Klamath Valley hospital.

Claton, son of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Claton of Klamath Falls, was shot by 12-year-old Richard Thompson Jr., also of Klamath Falls.

Hospital attendants reported Claton out of danger and suffering from severe face and deep chest wounds and a mangled right arm.

Thompson ran into his home and grabbed his father's shotgun and shot Claton from a distance of about 60 feet after the two entered into an argument.

Thompson called the police immediately after he shot his playmate. The youthful gunman is being held for juvenile authorities.
