

Rogues Vs. Redding Tonight At Fairgrounds; Locals Lose

Concluding game of the current four-game series between the Medford Rogues and the Redding Browns will be played tonight at the local fairgrounds park starting at 7:45. The local Far West league club plays at Klamath Falls this week-end.

The Rogues leave Friday and do not return until June 20 when the local boys play Willows.

Take away last night's sixth inning and add two or three local hits when men were on base and the Medford Rogues probably would have come through with their first victory of this series over the Redding Browns instead of losing 7 to 5 at the fairgrounds.

Al Bolen with two men out and a runner on second base threw Mike Bellone's grounder way over First Baseman Jack Cooney's head for a two-base error to start off Redding's rally.

Error Score Run
The error scored Catcher Ernie Choukolas, who had singled, from second base and put Bellone on second. Bob Thompson, the tall, rangy Negro first baseman of the Browns, then batted a no-balls, no-strikes pitch by Jack Lloyd over the Medford Neon Sign company sign for a home run for two more Redding runs.

Pat Gossney's single, a walk to "Sandy" Sandburg and Ken McGee's double tallied the last two Browns' runs.

Medford picked up a single run in the first stanza when Russ Stuart and Cooney drew walks. Stuart stole second and then tallied on a wild pitch.

Cooney Starts Rally
Cooney started off the fifth inning for the Rogues by lining a single to center, went to second when Johnny Popovich doubled off the fence in left and scored as Bob Haddock flied deep to center. Popovich went to third after the catch and then stole home.

Two runs for the Rogues in the ninth inning started off when Marc Guglielmo, batting for Lloyd, drew a walk, as did Stuart. When Redding's second baseman let Cooney's routine grounder go through his legs for an error, Jones, running for Guglielmo, scored.

Stuart in turn crossed the plate for Medford after Popovich flied to center. The next three men went down in order to end the Rogues' rally.

Kenny Carothers, who has been inactive since he won the southern Oregon welterweight crown by defeating Darrell Johnson of Medford, will defend his championship if a worthy foe can be found, Burdette said.

Golfing Open At Ardmore

Ardmore, Pa., June 8—(U.P.)—A jittery bunch of golfers teed off in the first round of the national open today, skeptical of how they might do over the course chosen for the golden anniversary of America's biggest tournament.

Practice rounds still left them timorous about the 6,694 yard par 70 layout of the Merion golf course. They feared the lightning fast greens and the tough rough of the championship east course.

A total of 165 was entered with 18 holes scheduled today, 18 tomorrow and the final 36 Saturday.

Most of them from Sammy Snead—favored at 3½ to one—on down, figured there were many more trouble holes than they wished to play. But most differed on which holes might cause the most trouble.

Ben Hogan, who thinks his game is "pretty sharp" and who is second choice to Snead in the betting at four to one, figured this might be the greatest three putt tournament in history.

Grants Pass Coaches Receive Raise in Pay
Grants Pass, Ore., June 8—(U.P.)—Head athletic coaches in Grants Pass schools have been given pay raises of \$130 annually by the school board.

Seattle, June 8—(U.P.)—The University of Washington basketball team will play host to the University of Pittsburgh in a two-game series December 19-20 this winter.



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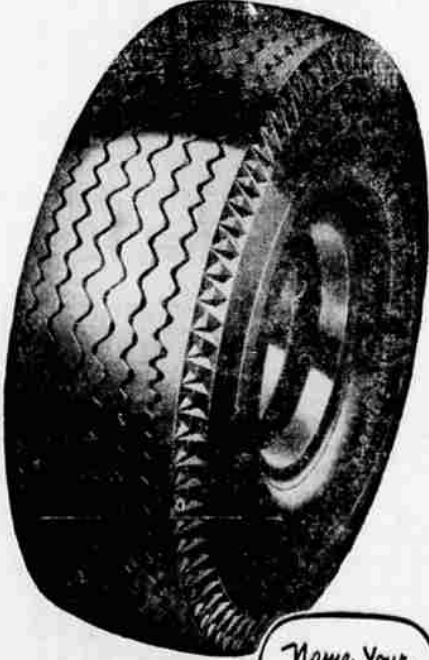
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
