Medalist Polly Riley of Fort Worth, Tex., was not expected to have any pushover in her second round foe, Pat Garner of Midland, Tex., playing in her first tournament since graduating from Texas Christian university.

Beverly Hanson of Indio, Cal., runner-up in medal play, met Bobby Dawson of Piedmont, Cal., in a re-play of their previous meeting in the finals in the California state and southern California tournaments in which Miss Hanson won both times.

Ex-Miss America Entry Jailed on Narcotics Charges

Detroit, Mich., June 8—(U.P.)—Peggy Ellsworth, Michigan's 1947 Miss America entry jailed on narcotics violation charges, said today that she became a dope addict because "everyone told me I had failed in life."

Narcotics agents said the 24-year-old, once-beautiful brunette admitted that she had been a heroin addict for about two months, but was cured by a drug prescribed by a doctor.

Needles Found
Authorities said they found hypodermic needles and narcotics scattered about Miss Ellsworth's apartment when they arrested her yesterday.

Miss Ellsworth said she became a photographic and fashion model in New York after placing 16th in the national beauty contest.

"The pay was good, but jobs didn't come up too often," she said. "Finally I got pneumonia and suffered a nervous breakdown."

The girl said she returned to Detroit after recovering, "but nobody would give me a job." "Everyone told me I had failed in life," she said. "They said I didn't have any talent."

Miss Ellsworth said that "just when I was feeling my lowest" she met a drummer "who had worked with some of the top bands in the country." She said she fell in love with him before learning he was a drug addict.

"I tried a marijuana cigarette at a party one night," she said. "I became an addict at that moment."

Miss Ellsworth refused to identify the musician.

Addicts Travel Far To Purchase Drugs

Toronto, Ont., June 8—(U.P.)—Narcotics addiction is "rampant" among Vancouver, B. C., girls and many of them are coming to Toronto to buy morphine at lower prices, a narcotics squad agent said.

Constable Alvin Sproule made the statement yesterday in testimony at the trial of Eleanor Canal, alias Carol, 22, who arrived here from Vancouver four weeks ago.

Miss Canal was convicted of illegal possession of narcotics and sentenced to six months in jail and fined \$200. Mary Ann Johnson, 27, also of Vancouver, was sentenced to nine months on a similar charge.

Sproule testified that Miss Canal had told him most of Vancouver's addicts were girls from 16 to 21 years old, and that she travelled here because she wanted to buy her supplies at lower prices than were charged in Vancouver.
