

Rogues Lose 13-12; Play On Week-end at K. Falls

Medford Rogues open a four game series at Klamath Falls tonight with single games this evening and Saturday and a doubleheader on Sunday. After that they play three Far West league tilts at Reno and four at Pittsburg before returning here June 20.

A baseball game was played at the local fairgrounds park last night but about the only good done from a Medford standpoint was the fattening of batting averages by the Medford Rogues as they rapped out 18 hits but dropped a 13 to 12 decision to Redding's Browns.

Wildness on the part of Pitcher Glen Hyatt in the eighth inning was largely responsible for the local Far West league's ninth loss since winning from Klamath Falls on June 2.

No Homeruns Made
Local hurlers kept the powerful Redding home-run-hitting boys under control and at one time the Rogues led 11 to 5 only to lose with a five-run rally by the Browns in that eighth inning. Hyatt put the tying run on base but the winning runs were scored off LaVerre Hermann who succeeded Hyatt on the mound.

Hermann was greeted with a single, three walks and a double for two runs and the winning margin for Redding. The Rogues had tallied six runs in the fifth inning to take the lead after the game had seen-sawed back and forth two or three times. They also rallied for a single run in the ninth frame on three singles in a row but they could produce but a single run for their efforts.

Williams Starts Rally
In the fifth for Medford, Don Williams opened by singling to left. Bill Adam dropped a Texas league single into center and when Jones tried to sacrifice, Pitcher Ben Scott of the Browns heaved the ball into right field scoring Williams.

Russ Stuart, Jack Cooney and Manager Tommy Nelson playing in place of Al Bolen who went to Idaho Falls, drew consecutive walks to force in Adam and a wild pitch tallied Jones. Stuart, Cooney and Nelson in turn scored on singles by Bob Haddock and Williams up for the second time.

Ninth Rally Begun
That ninth inning rally for the Rogues started off when Nelson lined a single to center as first man up. Haddock dumped a Texas league single into right center and Johnny Popovich rapped a ground ball single to left to score Nelson.

That left two on base and still no one out but Milt Martin popped out to shortstop. Williams fled to left just in front of the fence and after Adam walked to fill the bases, Hermann sent a long high fly to right for the final out for the Rogues.

Sale of 'A's' Said Near

Philadelphia, June 9—(U.P.)—Connie Mack and the rest of the Philadelphia Athletics management today awaited a "definite" offer from a well-heeled syndicate seeking to buy the club—lock, stock and barrel—for a reported \$5,000,000.

The syndicate, headed by Millionaire James P. Clark, is the same which purchased the Philadelphia Eagles of the National Football league last winter, plus "several other prominent" Philadelphiaans.

The A's management surprisingly did not snap a quick "no sale." Roy Mack, vice-president, said the club's controlling group would make a decision "when we have something to go on." He meant a definite money offer.

As a result, Clark, who operates a nationally known trucking concern, promised to make the "definite offer" some time this week-end, although at first he had preferred to have the A's current owners "name their own price."

All Kinds Records Lost As Red Sox Top Browns

New York, June 9—(U.P.)—Pity the poor Browns—they've got to show up against the murderous Red Sox once more today. But even more, pity the poor St. Louis fans who are expected to support one of the saddest looking clubs ever to represent a big league ball club.

If yesterday's record-smashing 29 to 4 Boston massacre of the Browns doesn't hasten the departure of the St. Louis franchise to Los Angeles or Baltimore then probably nothing ever will. **Savage Onslaught**

Yesterday's Brownie debacle was the most savage big league batting assault ever perpetrated in the 20th century, surpassing all but the ancient totals that were put into the books before the diamond was redesigned to its present dimensions.

In all the Red Sox topped seven major league marks and tied another. The 29 runs was the most for the 20th century, topping the 28 by the St. Louis Cards over Philadelphia in 1929. All 29 were batted in for another mark, exceeding the 26 driven in by the New York Giants over Brooklyn in 1944.

Coupled with the Six' 20 to 4 victory over the Browns in the previous outing, three other marks were listed. The two-day totals of 49 runs and 51 hits were official new marks and the total of 102 bases was listed, unofficially. And Red Sox Pitcher Chuck Stobbs set a new mark by walking in four consecutive innings.

Bobby Doerr hit three home runs to bat in eight runs, a record total. Ted Williams hit his 15th and 16th homers to increase his major league leading total and Rookie Walt Dropo got his 13th and 14th.

Al Zarilla tied a major league mark by hitting four doubles.
