Wheat Production Estimate Declines—Washington, June 10—(U.P.)—The agriculture department has forecast production of a below-average wheat crop of 944,514,000 bushels.

This compared with last year's outturn of 1,146,000,000 bushels and the previous 10-year average of 1,031,312,000 bushels. This meant that government probably will have to dip into its reserve stocks to meet combined domestic and export needs during the year ahead. It would be the first time in seven years the wheat crop fell below a billion bushels.

Painters' Union To Vote on Strike End—Los Angeles, June 10—(U.P.)—Members of the AFL Painters' union, district council 36, will vote Monday night on a proposal to end their strike against Los Angeles county painting contractors. It was announced today.

T. C. Canaday, executive secretary of the council, said the union strategy committee has recommended acceptance of the agreement, already approved by the contractors. The 14 locals belonging to the council were instructed to conduct votes Monday night.

"If the membership votes Monday night to accept the proposal, the strike is ended," Canaday said. "The union is setting up machinery to issue work orders Tuesday morning."

Palm Springs 'Mother' Dies of Heart Attack—Banning, Cal., June 10—(U.P.)—Mrs. Nellie Coffman, 82-year-old "mother" of Palm Springs, Cal., died today of a heart attack.

The founder and owner of the desert inn in the resort town was staying at her summer home here.

Mrs. Coffman started the hotel in 1909 and developed it into a multi-million dollar property. She also was credited with originating and carrying out most civic improvement projects that boomed Palm Springs into a large resort.

Naval Reservist Gets Praise for Devotion—Great Lakes, Ill., June 10—(U.P.)—Ninth naval district headquarters lists a naval reservist, Harry R. Craig of Greensburg, Kan., as its most conscientious seaman.

Capt. J. R. Wallace, chief of staff for the district, wrote Craig a letter commending him for driving 200 miles weekly to attend drills.

Since early 1949, Craig has driven 100 miles from his home to Hutchinson, Kan., and back each week to attend organized reserve drills.

Wallace's letter said "few officers or men can boast of your perfect attendance record and I am sure that none have fulfilled their obligations to the naval reserve at such real personal sacrifice."

Marion Population Passes 100,000; Salem Now 40,017

Salem, Ore., June 10—(U.P.)—Marion county now has a population of more than 100,000—more by less than 400, federal census figures showed today.

Marion county population now is 100,378, up 33.4 per cent since the federal count in 1940.

That makes Marion the first county in Oregon outside of Multnomah county to get an official count of more than 100,000, although the counts for Clackamas and Lane counties, also in the running, have not yet been announced.

The latest census figure compared with Marion county's 1940 population of 75,246. Salem contributes 40,017 to Marion county's population. The city has a total population of more than 43,000, but 3,047 reside in recently merged West Salem, which lies across the Willamette river in Polk county.

Other city figures announced Friday include: Aumsville 279; Aurora, 243; Gervais, 454; Hubbard, 491; Jefferson 633; Mt. Angel, 1,314; Scotts Mills 218; Silverton 3,117; Stayton 1,521; Sublimity 367; Turner 60; and Woodburn 2,396.

Former Disc Jockey Held on Check Charge

Sacramento, June 10—(U.P.)—Frank ("Rodeo Roy") Nicholson, former husband of the "sterilized heiress," Ann Coopers Hewitt, was freed tonight on \$2,500 bail after two days in jail on Nevada bad check charges.

Nicholson, a former San Francisco "disc jockey," waived extradition and will be taken to Tonopah, Nev., to face the charges within 10 days to two weeks, his attorney, E. Wayne Miller, said.

Miss Hewitt and Nicholson were married in San Rafael, Cal., in 1947, a day after the death of his previous wife. The marriage led to a trial and conviction for perjury in false-dating their prenuptial blood test certificate. They were divorced last month.
