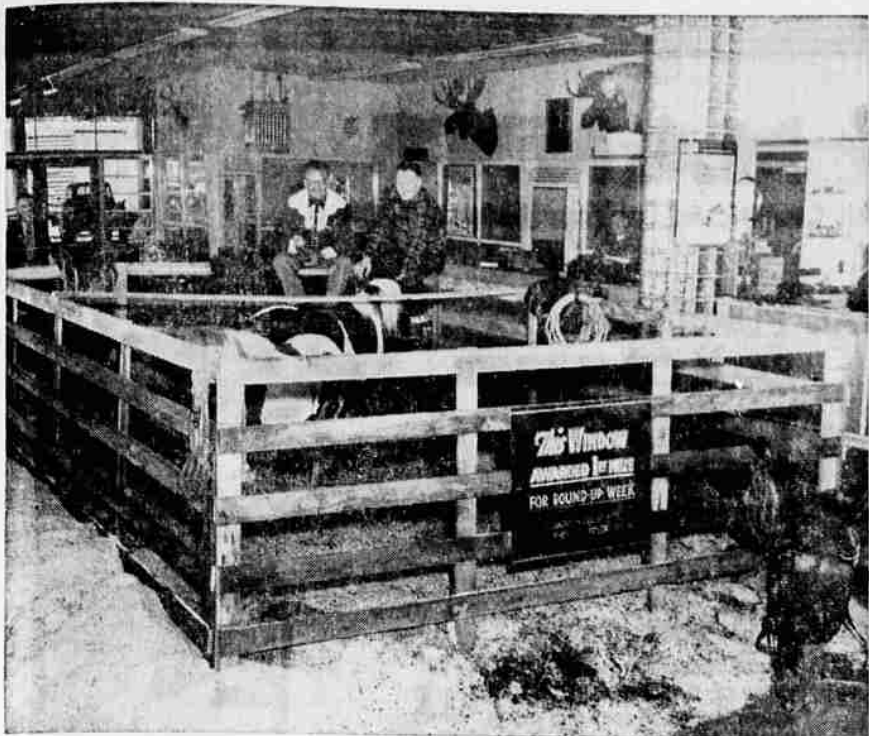

Restitution Made by Writer on Bad Checks

Mrs. Beattie Mitchell, operator of the Jacksonville sanitarium, has made full restitution of the checks she issued to creditors over the past two months without sufficient funds to pay, the district attorney's office said Saturday.

Mrs. Mitchell was arraigned on a criminal charge in justice court last Thursday and the case was continued until Friday afternoon. At that time she picked up the check held by the complainant in the case, Mildred Wilkins, and promised to clear up about nine others yesterday. Judge W. P. Tucker said Saturday the case had been continued indefinitely.

Two Crescent City Women Hurt in Wreck

Grants Pass, Ore., June 10 (U.P.)—Rheda Coalsen and Marilyn Casebeer, both of Crescent City, Calif., were injured Thursday afternoon when the car being driven by William Coalsen in which they were riding, collided head on with a lumber truck operated by Joe Stow of Cave Junction on the Hayes hill.

Coalsen was cited by state police for driving on the wrong side of the highway. The two women were brought to Josephine General Hospital in Grants Pass and released after emergency treatment. Neither was seriously injured. Stow is employed by the Sowell and Son Lumber company.

Air Force Reserve Officers To Train

Salem, Ore., June 10 (U.P.)—Air force reserve fliers from western Oregon will open a two-week training duty session at McNary field here Monday.

An air reserve training officer from Portland is in Salem Friday to discuss details of the flying maneuvers and to make plans for use of the airport here as an alternate field for the Portland air base by reserve fliers during the coming year.

City Manager J. L. Franzen said a contract between the city of Salem and the air reserve for use of the field might be formally signed today.

Portland fliers are slated to use the Salem airport each day during the two-week training period but will return to their homes each night.

Ashland Planning Gala July 4th, Celebration Set

Ashland, June 10—Ashland's turn to go western will come on July 2, 3 and 4 when the Lithia city hold its annual Fourth of July celebration in connection with a rodeo and horse races sponsored by the Ashland Riding association.

The three-day event is to include band and organ recitals, exhibitions of blooded horses, fireworks and special events for children, all in Lithia park in addition to the show at Ashland rodeo grounds.

Already Ashland clothiers are beginning to stock up on western and ranch-style apparel that is to be mandatory for all Ashland residents during the celebration.

To Exhibit Horses
One of the opening events of the affair will be the exhibition of registered horses on Winburn way in Lithia park. Thousands of visitors are expected to fill the spectators' gallery on the slopes of the park above the street. They will be given an opportunity to view classes of registered Arabians, palominos, Morgans, thoroughbreds, tennessees, American saddlers, and registered five-gaited horses.

Another unique feature of Sunday's program, July 2, will be a union religious service in the park that will include the massed voices and organs of southern Oregon and northern California churches. Amplification equipment will carry the service throughout the park.

The main parade of the celebration, for mounted entries exclusively, will be held Tuesday, July 4.

Eyewitness Tells Of Eruption by Hawaii Volcano

An eye-witness description of the recent eruption of the Hawaiian volcano, Mauna Loa, was given here yesterday by James Wintlerle, formerly of Medford, now visiting at the home of Mrs. Frances Stevens, 1208 Saling street.

Young Wintlerle is the son of Mr. and Mrs. T. D. Wintlerle, Salvation Army officers stationed in Medford until last year, and now serving in Honolulu. He attended Medford high school, and was graduated from Roosevelt high school, Honolulu, this month.

Flew Over Volcano
The young man flew over the erupting area of the volcano in a small plane during the height of the display. "It was pretty warm," he said, even at an altitude of 500 feet. The air was rough due to the updrafts created by the heat.

It was late in the afternoon when he made the flight, Wintlerle explained. The lava was not coming out of the main crater of the mountain, but out of three subsidiary craters or holes in the side of the mountain. The lava bubbled and churned, he said, sometimes spurting from 50 to 200 feet into the air.

"Hot And Beautiful"
"It looked mighty hot—and mighty beautiful," he said. It flowed down the slope in wide swaths toward the sea. Flying along the course of the flow, Wintlerle said he and his companion were above the cliffs when the lava dropped into the ocean. Huge clouds of steam boiled up from the lava when it hit the water, and although the liquid rock did nothing but glow as it flowed toward the sea, when it struck the water tongues of flame spurted upward, he said.

Unique Moon Raises Query

Late in the evening of May 19, my telephone rang. On the line was a very gracious woman who regretted bothering me. (Really, I don't mind honest inquiries at all. The time I was called out of bed around 3 a. m. to see sparks flying from the Pleiades—sparks which I couldn't see—might be an exception.)

The caller said she and several friends had been wondering what had happened to the moon. "Is there an eclipse? There is just a little rim of light on one side and the rest is quite dark—just barely visible. If it isn't an eclipse, what can be wrong with it? I am far from being young, but have never seen anything like this before."

Complete Dark Orb
Near the horizon and considerably north of west the "thin slip of a new moon" was beautiful in the unusually clear spring sky. Cradled in the luminous crescent there reposed an almost complete dark orb, "the old moon in the new moon's arms." The lighted and dark parts together formed a complete circular disk.

This inquiry is one which I receive year after year, especially on clear spring evenings when the crescent is far north and does not set until the sky is quite dark. The question is old to me but is always new to the inquirers. No, the dark part is not an eclipsed moon. Such events take place only at full phase.

The phenomenon in question is due to earth-shine, pure and simple. Around the time of the

new phase we see only a narrow rim of the half of the moon that is lighted by the sun. The rest of the illuminated part is turned away from us. Nearly all the side that is facing us is in the lunar night.

More Earth Light
If there were such creatures as moon-men, they would see a full earth at the same time that we see a crescent moon. Since the earth is much larger than our lunar neighbor, full earth casts 40 times the light that full moon ever gives us. No wonder then that their nocturnal landscape is so brilliantly lighted that even earth-dwellers are able to see it—although only faintly.

Through telescopes—especially early in the evening—this combination surrounded by the rich blue of the twilight sky forms a most charming picture. From night to night as the crescent becomes wider, the dim part becomes harder to see. By half-moon it is invisible excepting in optical instruments.

There will again be a crescent moon in the evening sky the latter part of this week and in an easy observing position north of west. Watch for the complete circle of visibility and the bewitching earth-shine on the dark part.

21 Cases of Mumps in Medford During Week

Twenty-one cases of mumps in Medford, four in Central Point and one in Gold Hill headed the list of 47 communicable diseases reported in Jackson county last week by the health department.

One case of infantile paralysis was also reported. Others reported were chicken pox, 13, in Medford; five pneumonia, Medford, and one each Vincent's angina and whooping cough, in Rogue River and Medford respectively.

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
